Collection Bin at Community Center or Deliver to Youmans

Book collection...already started. If your friends or neighbors are cleaning-up or downsizing they can donate their books to our sale and help send a girl to college. We are looking for gently used books of all kinds: hardcovers, paperbacks, fiction, nonfiction, children's and more!

Donation is Easy. Deposit good, clean, saleable books in the book collection bin at the Falls Church Community Center between March 1 and April 2. Or bring them to Mary Youman's (4419 N. 18th Street, Arlington) during book sorting (10-3 any Saturday in March between 9am and 3pm). If that isn't convenient, call the Youmans (703/528-8993) for a time to deliver the books.

Donations are 50% tax deductible. Value assigned by the donor. Sale profits fund scholarships for local girls and AAUW's national scholarship program for women and girls. So when you donate a book, you help send a girl to college.

Guidelines for book donations. Our customers don't buy magazines, textbooks, encyclopedias, old reference books, or books that are damaged, moldy or in poor condition – no matter how meaningful they are to the donor. So please explain to people that we accept only saleable books in good condition and remind them about the list of things we can't take. The other books, unfortunately, should be recycled.



Book Sorting

Sorting is our biggest effort starting in March. We've already told you about sorting above. But it's an important job and FUN, too. It's also a good way to meet people, so we don't want you to miss it.

Publicity

Publicity is key, because it draws paying customers. Pick up your posters and book marks at the next meeting or sorting session and signup for a convenient location. Start distributing book marks NOW. And hang the posters the week of April 1.

This year we are trying to increase our online publicity. If your organization has an online presence, please copy and send the "blurbs" below at the appropriate times.

At sale jobs

We have several different jobs at the sale. The two main jobs are selling and straightening books. Both are covered by the job title of Book Handler, signup at [Signup-FC AAUW 2017 Booksale](#).

The goal of straightening books is to keep things looking good, tempting buyers to stay longer. Pick a table that is fairly empty of buyers; smile and tell them what you are doing and go to it! Make sure the spines are all facing the same direction. Consolidate loose boxes by moving books from the floor or combining boxes. If there is space, spread out the boxes enough that people

don't have to crowd to see them. The goal is to make the sale as easy and inviting for buyers as possible. This is the job for people who don't like handling money or want to exercise their inner neat-nic.

Selling books is what it's all about! The job is comparable to retail clerking; if you like books, people, or money, it's really rewarding. There are 70 distinct jobs during the sale, so sign up for at least one 3-hour shift! The link is [Signup-FC AAUW 2017 Booksale](#).



AAUW Educational Foundation

Our book sale helps women and girls.

Are you wondering where our money goes? Well, our branch provides scholarships to local high schools girls and grants to local organizations helping educate girls. We also donate generously to the AAUW Fellowships (third largest donor in Virginia in 2016).

AAUW is the largest source of funding exclusively for graduate women in the world, supports aspiring scholars around the globe, teachers and activists in local communities, women at critical stages of their careers, and those pursuing professions where women are underrepresented. AAUW awarded \$3.7 million in funding for more than 230 fellowships and grants to outstanding women and nonprofit organizations in the 2016–17 academic year.



Falls Church AAUW expects to complete funding the endowment for a career development grant with this sale, at which point this grant will help women return to university for education to advance their careers. It will join our fully funded American Fellowship grant that is supporting Monish Roa's fellowship at American University this year. Monisha's goal is to work as a prosecutor on litigating sexual assault and domestic violence cases.

In celebration of Women's History Month, I asked some of our members to showcase women who have or are currently inspiring them. They have plumbed their hearts and share the below with you. Thank you to all women everywhere who lead by example, with quiet strength or loud roars. --KKM

"Women Who Inspired Me" by Martha Trunk

My mother – she could always find money to make sure we had the extras.

My High School Counselor – taught me not to quit.

My neighbor who read books.

My first boss – a woman who'd made it in a man's field in 1964.

My last boss – a woman who always had her ear to the ground, finding new programs with little budgeted money, networking to get knowledge and help and who let me try approaches that had failed in the past and despite incredible pressure for management stayed the course.

My fellow AAUW members who are still doing things to make the world a better place.

"Profile of a Woman Who Inspires Me" by Anna Shaffer

Helen Keller has always been a very inspirational woman figure in my life from early childhood when I read and wrote about her life. Helen's achievements changed the world especially for the handicapped by giving millions hope and courage to be successful to follow in her footsteps. Helen was an accomplished author of many books, first deaf blind person to earn a bachelor's degree, prominent political and social activist, renowned speaker, and truly loved by many around the world. Helen's biography has always given me the drive to strive harder in pursuit of setting and achieving goals throughout my life. And, knowing that even if I do not succeed at times that at least I stepped out of my comfort zone to do different things that I thought were beyond me.

"Guiding Lights" by Kristan McMahan

My life has been peppered with adventurous women, both those I've known in real life and those who have been aspirations. The kindergarten teacher who brought in interesting food to expand the palates of five-year-olds beyond macaroni and hot dogs. The second grade teacher who recognized a feminist in the making and let me write about Susan B. Anthony, Eleanor Roosevelt, and Amelia Earhart, but also nurtured my introverted side by letting me read at recess in a comfy chair. The three aforementioned famous women, among many others, about whom I have devoured biographies, novels, movies, and documentaries. My mother, who always told me I could be whatever I wanted to be because she had long been frustrated by those who told her she had to be something because that was what women did. (That worked out just fine until I told her I wanted to be a Catholic priest because he got to stand up in front of people to talk and they had to pay attention.) I wouldn't be who I am if even one of those women hadn't been who she was.

We will also be discussing the play and the book after the performance over dinner at Anthony's restaurant for those who want to go. It is not necessary to have read the book to attend the dinner.

Here is a synopsis of this classic: **To Kill a Mockingbird ([To Kill a Mockingbird #1](#))** by [Harper Lee](#)
The unforgettable novel of a childhood in a sleepy Southern town and the crisis of conscience that rocked it, To Kill A Mockingbird became both an instant bestseller and a critical success when it was first published in 1960. It went on to win the Pulitzer Prize in 1961 and was later made into an Academy Award-winning film, also a classic.

Compassionate, dramatic, and deeply moving, To Kill A Mockingbird takes readers to the roots of human behavior - to innocence and experience, kindness and cruelty, love and hatred, humor and pathos. Now with over 18 million copies in print and translated into forty languages, this regional story by a young Alabama woman claims universal appeal. Harper Lee always considered her book to be a simple love story. Today it is regarded as a masterpiece of American literature.

It will be a combination of history, wellness, community and education, hosted by the Tinner Hill Heritage Foundation and the six women elected to serve in Falls Church.

See the [attached flyer](#) for details. The walk will end at the Falls Church Community Center with a Community Resource Fair. We hope the AAUW will set up a table and be part of this.

We will be adding the names of participating organizations and will begin to promote it to the community later this week.

We want to do two things - walk - to promote healthy living. The difference with this walk is the walk would be a history walk and we would highlight the history of women who have been instrumental in shaping the history of Falls Church. We would begin at the Tinner Hill Historic Site and end at Cherry Hill Park (weather permitting). Persons who come to mind are Maddy Gundry, Mary Ellen Henderson, Sarah Wren (widow of James Wren architect of the Falls Church, who emancipated the enslaved people willed to her by her husband after seeing they were able to read), Betsy Read, who helped her father run a school for free and enslaved people in Falls Church before and during the civil war. Viola Hudson, who advocated & got mail service and electricity for African American areas in Falls Church. She also organized a girl scout troop for black girls.
