

From the President . . .

Now is the Time for Action!

The Board of AAUWFC has approved an **Action Plan** for our branch. You will remember that our branch engaged in a Visioning Process last year guided by staff from the AAUW Leadership Development Department. We first defined our mission or focus for the branch. Next, we identified three goals to achieve that mission.

Mission: The Falls Church Area Branch of AAUW is committed to funding scholarships, creating and maintaining social bonds among members, providing educational events for the branch and the community, and participating in the AAUW Lobby Corps.

Goals:

- 1. Increase visibility in the community to attract a more diverse membership, increase attendance at Branch meetings, and serve the community through Branch activities.
- 2. Increase revenue for scholarships
- 3. Create bonds between scholarship recipients and the branch

In September of this year, an Action Plan Subcommittee of Anne Baxter, Susan Conklin, Bunny Jarrett, and Molly Jewell was appointed to develop action steps to achieve our goals. The subcommittee submitted their report to the board at the September 22

meeting. The Action Plan was discussed, amended and adopted by the board at that meeting.

The **Action Plan** is printed in its entirety in this newsletter. Please take time to read it carefully and decide where you can step up and make your voice heard and make our branch all that it can be.

There are many opportunities for members to participate on a one-time or an occasional basis. Think about how branch meetings, fundraising, or new member recruitment would be if you offered your ideas to make things different or make things better. Many of you are longtime members of the Falls Church branch, and you have a unique perspective. Others of you are newer members and bring fresh ideas from your own personal or professional experience. We want to hear them all!

I hope to see all of you at the October 6th meeting on GOTV (Get Out the Vote) and issues relevant to AAUW members in the midterm elections. Our well-attended meeting in September on different approaches to STEM was excellent and got the year off to a good start. Let's keep the momentum going!

Nancy Fulwiler

Nancy loves book clubs. That's one of the things that attracted her to our branch. She jumped right in to attend the September book club meeting and will host the November meeting.

Nancy and her husband recently returned from Rwanda where he served in a position with the State Department. They are looking forward to his retirement in 18 months.

Nancy earned a degree in the '70s in Forestry from the University of Washington in Seattle. Her interest in the fledging field of environmental studies led her to become one of only a few women to study forestry. Her particular interest in "super trees" led her to take instruction on becoming a climber. However, she found there was a lack of infrastructure to support women in this traditionally male field. She returned to university studies twice – once to study accounting and almost achieve an MBA and years later to earn a Master's in Education.

Nancy worked as a manager in the high tech industry before joining her husband in his corporate communications/finance business. When he joined the State Department, Nancy was enthusiastic. Their career took them to West Africa, to Washington, DC to work for an NGO and do 1:1 tutoring of children, to Japan for four years, to Afghanistan for one year where Nancy served as a community liaison officer, to Geneva for three years where she worked with USAID, and finally to Rwanda for one year where she worked for the CDC followed by organizational work. Since she returned to the U.S. she has been taking a breather before starting a new job working for the African Bureau of the State Department.

Nancy and her husband have two adult sons who are settled in interesting careers of their own.

Nancy is drawn to AAUW's emphasis on women's issues and our book club. She has a continued interest in human trafficking and looks forward to our program coming up in January.

From the Board . . .

The Board met September 22, 2014 at the home of Susan Conklin.

Membership: Kitty Richardson represented our branch at the Elementary PTA Ice Cream Social and Information Fair on September 9. She will send the 2014-2015 Membership Handbooks to new members along with the volunteer survey.

Programs: For the October meeting, Melissa Jackowski, Grassroots Advocate from the National AAUW Office, will speak on AAUW issues and the November election. Members will be encouraged to advertise these meeting to friends and other organizations. The topic of the January meeting will be Human Trafficking. The meeting

will be on Sunday, January 25, and it will be co-sponsored with the League of Women Voters (LWV) of Falls Church. Bunny and Peggy will apply for an AAUW-VA IMPACT Grant of \$100 to support this meeting. The Board agreed that we should communicate opportunities in the STEM area to members who can individually volunteer to support STEM activities of other branches and organization.

Scholarship: Sharon Zackula has been appointed to the Local Scholarship Committee. New member Pepper Dittinger has been appointed as a Shadow Member. They join the current members: Anne Baxter and Elizabeth Kessell.

Treasurer: Martha reported that we currently have 39 paid members, including three new members in the past month. Martha indicated that she would revise the budget in early November to reflect the current membership. She anticipates the dues will not cover the budgeted item we need to run the branch, and we will have to draw from other funds.

Communications: Becky Gaul keeps a current Branch Membership List on the website that can be accessed by all members. Becky will form a Communications Subcommittee with specific people assigned to the various news outlets to market our branch activities.

Youth Representatives initiative: The Youth Representatives Initiative was discussed. The Executive Committee voted in the interim between the August and September board meeting to host two high school students to be non-voting Youth Representatives on our board beginning in November 2014. The students are part of the Youth Representative Initiative to increase volunteer opportunities for Falls Church Youth on Government and community organizations. Mary Ellen Gannon has volunteered to represent AAUWFC to the Youth Representative Recommendation Committee (YR2C).

AAUWFC ACTION PLAN Approved by the Board September 22, 2014

PRIORITY #1: MEMBERSHIP/PROGRAMMING

Goal: Increase visibility in the community

- 1. Increase the number of volunteers in AAUWFC-sponsored events
 - > 7 months/March 2015: 50% of members will have volunteered
 - ➤ 10 months/June 2015: 75% of members will have volunteered
- 2. Establish a Communications Committee to market our branch and our events. Suggested outlets: FC News Press, online news outlets, local and state AAUW websites, Falls Church City Public Schools and PTAs, Moms Groups
 - ➤ 3 months/Nov 2014: Communication Committee will be appointed and functioning
 - > 7 months/March 2015: Committee report at Annual Meeting
 - ➤ 10 months/June 2015: Meetings and events are publicized by the committee 75% of the time

Goal: Recruit and maintain a diverse membership

- 1. The Membership Vice President will gather information about the diversity of our community and community organizations with a specific ethnic or cultural focus.
 - ➤ 5 months/Jan 2015: Membership Vice President will report to the Board. The Board will make recommendations for topics and issues to be considered by the membership.
- 2. The topics and issues identified by the Board will be discussed by the members.
 - > 7 months/March 2015: Members will discuss topics and issues in a small group or a group as a whole at the March Business meeting and make recommendations for program planning for 2015-2016.
 - ➤ 13 months/September 2015: Member recommendations will be considered in planning programs for the year.

Goal: Provide educational events for the branch and the community

- ➤ 4 months/Dec 2014: Create a Permission Form for using scholarship recipients names and pictures in branch publicity
- ➤ 9 months/May 2015: Past Local Scholarship winner will speak at Scholarship Awards meeting
- ➤ 10 months/June 2015: Form completed by all Local Scholarship winners by May Awards Meeting
