Women in Service: Doughnut Dollies at the Front

At our September 9th meeting, Susan Conklin of AAUW-Falls Church will introduce "A Touch of Home," a documentary about young women who served as Red Cross volunteers in Vietnam from 1966 to 1972. Called "Donut Dollies," over 600 young women served in country in Vietnam at or near combat situations, flying out daily to visit American soldiers, Marines and airmen at "fire bases." Susan and her colleagues were at or near the "front lines" of Vietnam from January 1968 to January 1969. She will **share some of her experiences**, including being in combat situations and being airlifted with the wounded. There is no longer a women's volunteer program; **women advocated** for greater roles in the armed services, and the presence of these volunteers and women serving in the armed forces often at or near the front lines was proof that there was a **place for women** in combat. Serving in combat is linked to women's professional advancement in the armed services and opportunities to assume leadership roles.

Ralls Girls Workshop Sponsorship Approved

We have our first funded Special Project of the year – and it is a STEM project! The Board has approved \$200 for a contributing sponsorship of the **Rails Girls Workshop** at George Mason University, September 7, 2013. This program combines computer science with the digital humanities. It will give girls and young women an opportunity to learn about current programming skills in a supportive and energizing environment.

Rails Girls was born in Finland but is now a **global**, **non-profit volunteer effort** to give tools and a community for women to understand technology and to build their ideas. Participants learn sketching, prototyping, and basic programming and get introduced to the world of technology.

Some **explanation of terms** may be helpful. A desktop computer power supply **rail** or **voltage rail** refers to a single voltage provided by a power supply unit (PSU). It is suggested that the term rail in the Rail Girls program implies power and computer savvy energy.

The **digital humanities** are an area of research, teaching, and creation concerned with the intersection of computing and the disciplines of the humanities. Digital humanities embrace a **variety of topics**, from curating online collections to data mining large cultural data sets.

As a **co-sponsor, AAUW** will have "advertising space" on tee-shirts given at the workshop and on the website. This is a great way for us to **gain visibility** for AAUW with college-age women. Thanks to Sally Brett for bringing this opportunity to our attention and to Kitty Richardson for submitting the application for Special Projects funding.

In order to continue to get information from AAUW at the branch, state and national levels, **your contact information should be current**. If you have a change in this information please update it using the following guide.

To Update Your Information

First, find your AAUW member number (3 ways)

- 1. Look on the label of your AAUW Outlook magazine
- Go to <u>www.aauw.org</u> and click on "Login" at the top. At the Login page, click on "Forgot AAUW Member ID?" and enter required information to get your number
- 3. Contact AAUW at 800/326-AAUW and ask for your number

Second, if you are online: Enter or edit your address, email, and phone number in the AAUW Member Services Database (MSD)

- Go to <u>www.aauw.org</u>
- $\circ~$ Go to bottom of the page and Click on "Member Tools"
- Log into Member Tools (see above if you don't have your member number at hand)
- Once in Member Tools, click on "Enter Here" at the Member Services Database (MSD) toward the bottom of the page
- o Click on "Enter Member Services Database"
- Click on "My Profile in top left column and make changes as directed.
- Alternatively you can call AAUW at 800/326-AAUW and ask that your contact information be corrected.
- Why keep this updated? Your mailing label for *Outlook* and the *Virginia Vision* come from this list, plus the address for all emails to you from national or Virginia is pulled from the MSD.

About a quarter are mothers and many have significant work and family responsibilities. Dr. Hill will talk about the **AAUW report** *Women in Community College: Access to Success*. This report identifies **challenges** facing student parents and opportunities in **STEM** fields, as well how community colleges can provide more women with a reliable path to opportunity and **economic security**. **Catherine Hill** is a Director of Research at AAUW and an author or co-author of many AAUW reports including *Women in Community College: Access to Success* (2013); *Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation* (2012); *Crossing the Line: Sexual*

Harassment at School (2011); Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (2010) and Where the Girls Are: the Facts about Gender Equity in Education (2008). Before coming to AAUW, Dr. Hill was a Study Director at the Institute for Women's Policy Research and an assistant professor at the University of Virginia. She has a bachelor and master's degree from Cornell University and a Ph.D. in policy development from Rutgers University

This program is free and open to the public. After the program there will be a Northern District business meeting.
