From the Board

The Board did not meet during February. Business was conducted by email.

The Board decided to sponsor a table at the **Fall Festival** in September as we did last year. We will not have a table at the Memorial Day celebration.

The Board nominated 18 members to be **Names Honored** at the AAUW-VA Convention in April. We were able to nominate one member for every \$500 donated by our branch.

This year the branch donated \$9172.00 to the Career Development Fellowship and individual members donated \$231.00 to AAUW Funds.

The Board approved the following **Special Project** applications: **Aurora House**, a residential counseling center for girls ages 13-17 in Falls Church City, \$300 for etiquette class for residents. This class will help girls in their daily lives in the house and help them face new situations with greater confidence. Submitted by Mollie Jewell and Mary Youman.

J.E.B. Stuart High School AVID Program in Falls Church, \$750 to help pay for trips to visit colleges. The AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) Program targets students who clearly have the potential to go to college but need more guidance and resources to get there. Must of the students in AVID will be the first in their families to go to college. Submitted by Pam Martinov.

NCCWSL: Sponsor a George Mason University coed to participate in the AAUW National Conference for College Women Student Leaders, \$395 for resident conference attendee fees. This award will continue our sponsorship of young women undergraduates as they participate in an AAUW conference that not only apprises them of graduate educational opportunities and undergraduate opportunities to lead and learn but also encourages membership in AAUW. Visioning Project Summary

Our Falls Church Area Branch participated in a pilot project with the national office of AAUW from November 2-13 to February 2014. Stephanie Kraemer and Deepti Gudipati of the AAUW Member Leadership Programs Department, aided by Denise Decker, facilitated interactive workshops to engage us in a deliberative process of defining the focus or vision of our branch and determining action steps to achieve our vision.

November 11, 2013 Workshop 1: Identifying Our Branch Focus or Vision

Members identified a focus statement of **what the Branch cares most about** and what the Branch does to achieve its mission: 1) raise money for scholarships (through the book sale; 2) create and maintain social bonds among members; 3) provide educational events for the Branch and the community; and (4) participate in Lobby Corps.

January 12, 2014 Workshop 2: Goals to Achieve our Vision

The group defined and discussed **three major goals for the branch**: (1) increase visibility in the community, (2) increase revenue for scholarships, and, (3) create bonds between scholarship recipients and the branch.

February 9, 2014 Workshop 3: Marketing Our Branch

Deepti and Denise shared practices and tips to improve our marketing, not just of an event, but the whole of what we do and who we are. Marketing was defined as telling

people **who you are, what you do, why they should care** about what you do, and (most importantly) what you want them to do with that information.

Our "brand identity" was defined as **what people think of us, not what we think of ourselves**! Once we have examined and settled on our branch brand, we need to start thinking about communicating our branch out to the world.

When we design our next schedule/calendar of branch programs and events, we should use these questions to put our schedule to the marketing/messaging test: Does our schedule of programs accurately communicate our branch brand? What audience is our program schedule likely to attract? Is this the target audience we want to attract? Could we adapt our program schedule to appeal to a wider demographic (and hence, find new potential members).

During the workshop, we suggested **changes in our Book Sale poster** using the following guidelines: (1) Grab their attention *first*. (2)Focus on what *they* need and want. (3) Your branch brand should be well represented in your messaging. (4) Images are powerful. Make them count.

Many guidelines were given for designing an effective website. One of the most important was to make our website **reader-focused** rather than organization-focused. Reader-focused content anticipates and answers their questions, does not use organization-specific language, uses the pronoun "you," and helps the reader to find the information she is looking for.

The full report of the visioning project will be available to members on our branch website. The document will be used in the coming months to plan activities for the coming year and revise our marketing materials.
