Dues are coming due

It's that time of year again. Time to renew your membership by playing dues for Fiscal Year 2017-2018. The national dues are \$49, state dues are \$15 and our local dues are \$13. There are two options for paying: online or by check.

To pay online click on the link in the email you receive. It will link to your account in the Member Data Base. Put in your credit card number and you're done. Unless you'd like to contribute either to the an AAUW fund or to our Career Development Grant #4350, which is in the dropdown menu, add the amount you'd like to contribute.

If you'd like to pay by check, please make it payable to AAUW and mail to Martha Trunk at 6571 Snowbell Lane, Falls Church, VA 22042 before June 30, 2017 or to Anne Baxter at 6337 Hillcrest Drive, Alexandria, VA after July 1, 2017.

Note: There will be a vote for an increase of National dues at the convention and our branch will also vote on an increase in dues in June. Both increases, if approved, would be for Fiscal Year 2018-2019.

Time to Vote in the 2017 AAUW Election



In April and May, you should have received emails from Mark Hopkins, AAUW Interim Chief Executive Officer, inviting you to vote in the 2017 AAUW Election. The emails have a link to the ballot and include your member ID and unique voter PIN. All AAUW members in good standing are eligible and encouraged to vote. If you have not already done so,

be sure to cast your ballot before June 15 at 9 p.m. ET, when voting ends.

In addition to voting on candidates for the AAUW Board of Directors, you are able to vote on amendments to the AAUW Bylaws, proposed resolutions, and proposed changes to the AAUW Public Policy Program. Issues on this year's ballot include adding gun violence as a public health concern to AAUW's Public Policy Program, resolutions on the Equal Rights Amendment and human trafficking, changing AAUW's membership requirements in the bylaws, and changing the name of the Public Policy Program to Public Policy Priorities. This last proposed change is in response to comments from AAUW members about an earlier draft of the bylaw which would have eliminated the requirement that the entire membership vote on the Public Policy Program. By making this change, members retain the right to vote on the issues for which AAUW will advocate. Information about the candidates and ballot issues are available on the AAUW website, www.aauw.org and in the spring copy of *Outlook* magazine.

teaching capacities during her federal career. She would describe her current role of managing a learning function as her dream job.



SEPTEMBER selection: THE REFUGEES by Viet Thanh Nguyen




With the coruscating gaze that informed *The Sympathizer*, in *The Refugees* Viet Thanh Nguyen gives voice to lives led between two worlds, the adopted homeland and the country of birth. From a young Vietnamese refugee who suffers profound culture shock when he comes to live with two gay men in San Francisco, to a woman whose husband is suffering from dementia and starts to confuse her for a former lover, to a girl living in Ho Chi Minh City whose older half-sister comes back from America having seemingly accomplished everything she never will, the stories are a captivating testament to the dreams and hardships of immigration.

This second piece of fiction by a major new voice in American letters, *The Refugees* is a beautifully written and sharply observed book about the aspirations of those who leave one country for another, and the relationships and desires for self-fulfillment that define our lives.

OCTOBER selection: <u>COMMONWEALTH</u> by Ann Patchett

One Sunday afternoon in Southern California, Bert Cousins shows up at Franny Keating's christening party uninvited. Before evening falls, he has kissed Franny's mother, Beverly—thus setting in motion the dissolution of their marriages and the joining of two families. Spanning five

decades, *Commonwealth* explores how this chance encounter reverberates through the lives of the four parents and six children involved. Spending summers together in Virginia, the Keating and Cousins children forge a lasting bond that is based on a shared disillusionment with their parents and the strange and genuine affection that grows up between them. When, in her twenties, Franny begins an affair with the legendary author Leon Posen and tells him about her family, the story of her siblings is no longer hers to control. Their childhood becomes the basis for his wildly successful book, ultimately forcing them to come to terms with




their losses, their guilt, and the deeply loyal connection they feel for one another.

Told with equal measures of humor and heartbreak, <u>Commonwealth</u> is a meditation on inspiration, interpretation, and the ownership of stories. It is a brilliant and tender tale of the far-reaching ties of love and responsibility that bind us together.

NOVEMBER Selection: <u>AMERICAN NATIONS: A HISTORY OF THE ELEVEN REGIONAL CULTURES</u> <u>OF NORTH AMERICA</u> by Colin Woodard

An illuminating history of North America's eleven rival cultural regions that explodes the red state-blue state myth. North America was settled by people with distinct religious, political, and ethnographic characteristics, creating regional cultures that have been at odds with one another ever since. Subsequent immigrants didn't confront or assimilate into an "American" or "Canadian" culture, but rather into one of the eleven distinct regional ones that spread over the continent each staking out mutually exclusive territory.



In <u>American Nations</u>, Colin Woodard leads us on a journey through the history of our fractured continent, and the rivalries and alliances between its component nations, which conform to neither state nor international boundaries. He illustrates and explains why "American" values vary sharply from one region to another. Woodard reveals how intranational differences have played a pivotal role at every point in the continent's history, from the American Revolution and the Civil War to the tumultuous sixties and the "blue county/red county" maps of recent presidential elections. <u>American Nations</u> is a revolutionary and revelatory take on America's myriad identities and how the conflicts between them have shaped our past and are molding our future.


