

Getting as many books sorted as we can now will really help if we have bad weather in March. Come any time between 10 and 3pm. Stay as long as you want. No sign-up needed.

Sorting basics. We sort outdoors (in the driveway) in the Youman's driveway (4419 N. 18th Street, Arlington), so dress for the weather. We suggest layers and/or sunscreen. Call ahead if the weather looks poor - Mary's phone is 703-528-8993. Saturday we start at 10, and go until we finish (but no later than 4pm). Come when you can, for as long as you want.

Never sorted before? Don't worry. No experience is necessary; we offer on-the-job training. And we have uploaded our "How to sort books" onto Google, so you can see it. Just follow this

link: <Book sort fact sheet>. We invite all book sorters to share in a simple lunch each week, so you don't have to worry about getting hungry. And, remember, book sorters get first crack at purchasing the books!

Federal Lobby Day

Results from Public Policy Survey:

As you may recall, earlier this year AAUW of Virginia members were asked to complete a survey

to determine what public policy priorities we should focus on at the State level during 2017-2018. In the survey, members were also asked whether they individually wanted to take a more active role in public policy activities. Thanks to those who completed the survey and to those who indicated that they want to take a more active role in public policy.

The top public policy priorities identified for focus by survey respondents were:

- 1. Pay equity and fairness in compensation (85 votes)
- 2. Access to quality, affordable health care (79 votes)
- 3. Implementation of fair, nonpartisan legislative redistricting tied with adequate funding for public education (70 votes each)

In response to those members interested in becoming more active in public policy activities, we are activating the AAUW of Virginia Public Policy Committee. This standing committee is already authorized by the AAUW of Virginia by-laws: AAUW-of-Virginia-Bylaws-2016-Nov-6.pdf. Initially, we will be focusing on pay equity (legislation prohibiting employers from asking job candidates their salary histories during the hiring process) and fair, nonpartisan legislative redistricting. Examples of the types of assignments committee members may work on are:

1. Pay Equity (Salary History)

- Researching State and local successes in passing pay equity salary history legislation (i.e., Massachusetts, California, Philadelphia and New York City)
- Contacting AAUW State and local branches in Massachusetts, California, Philadelphia and New York City to discuss their successful strategies, including overcoming arguments from the opposition and eliciting support from the business community
- Identifying/contacting Virginia Delegate(s) and Senator(s) to champion pay equity legislation
- Building support in the business community

2. Fair, Nonpartisan Legislative Redistricting

- Coordinating the showing of the OneVirginia2021 Foundation's documentary
 GerryRIGGED: Turning Democracy on its Head by our branches around the state, in
 collaboration with other community groups (NOTE: AAUW of Virginia will work with
 OneVirginia2021 and the OneVirginia2021 Foundation on efforts to educate the public
 on the need for fair, nonpartisan legislative redistricting. However, AAUW is nonpartisan
 and we do not endorse candidates or engage in other partisan activities.
 OneVirginia2021 has endorsed candidates for public office and we will not collaborate
 with them on any partisan activities.)
- Working with local governments on resolutions in support of redistricting reform
- Contacting/meeting with State lawmakers, as appropriate

- Researching efforts in other states to pass redistricting reform bills
- Contacting other AAUW State branches (especially Pennsylvania) on their successes, strategies, and their redistricting website information

Book Club News

We'll be discussing The Refugees (see below for the descriptions of the Fall selections). Drop in monthly or whenever you feel like it!

SEPTEMBER selection: THE REFUGEES by Viet Thanh Nguyen

With the coruscating gaze that informed *The Sympathizer*, in *The Refugees* Viet Thanh Nguyen gives voice to lives led between two worlds, the adopted homeland and the country of birth. From a young Vietnamese refugee who suffers profound culture shock when he comes to live with two gay men in San Francisco, to a woman whose husband is suffering from dementia and starts to confuse her for a former lover, to a girl living in Ho Chi Minh City whose older half-sister comes back from America having seemingly accomplished everything she never will, the stories are a captivating testament to the dreams and hardships of immigration.

This second piece of fiction by a major new voice in American letters, *The Refugees* is a beautifully written and sharply observed book about the aspirations of those who leave one country for another, and the relationships and desires for self-fulfillment that define our lives.

OCTOBER selection: COMMONWEALTH by Ann Patchett

One Sunday afternoon in Southern California, Bert Cousins shows up at Franny Keating's christening party uninvited. Before evening falls, he has kissed Franny's mother, Beverly—thus setting in motion the dissolution of their marriages and the joining of two families. Spanning five decades, *Commonwealth* explores how this chance encounter reverberates through the lives of the four parents and six children involved. Spending summers together in Virginia, the Keating and Cousins children forge a lasting bond that is based on a shared disillusionment with their parents and the strange and genuine affection that grows up between them. When, in her twenties, Franny begins an affair with the legendary author Leon Posen and tells him about her family, the story of her siblings is no longer hers to control. Their childhood becomes the basis for his wildly successful book, ultimately forcing them to come to terms with their losses, their guilt, and the deeply loyal connection they feel for one another.

Told with equal measures of humor and heartbreak, *Commonwealth* is a meditation on inspiration, interpretation, and the ownership of stories. It is a brilliant and tender tale of the far-reaching ties of love and responsibility that bind us together.

NOVEMBER Selection: AMERICAN NATIONS: A HISTORY OF THE ELEVEN REGIONAL CULTURES OF NORTH AMERICA by Colin Woodard

An illuminating history of North America's eleven rival cultural regions that explodes the red state-blue state myth. North America was settled by people with distinct religious, political, and ethnographic characteristics, creating regional cultures that have been at odds with one another ever since. Subsequent immigrants didn't confront or assimilate into an "American" or "Canadian" culture, but rather into one of the eleven distinct regional ones that spread over the continent each staking out mutually exclusive territory.

In *American Nations*, Colin Woodard leads us on a journey through the history of our fractured continent, and the rivalries and alliances between its component nations, which conform to neither state nor international boundaries. He illustrates and explains why "American" values vary sharply from one region to another. Woodard reveals how intranational differences have played a pivotal role at every point in the continent's history, from the American Revolution and the Civil War to the tumultuous sixties and the "blue county/red county" maps of recent presidential elections. *American Nations* is a revolutionary and revelatory take on America's myriad identities and how the conflicts between them have shaped our past and are molding our future.
