# **November Meeting**

This topic has affect beyond the academy, as Katherine, who is politically active in Virginia and in AAUW, will explain. ### **October Meeting Recap**

October's meeting was a look at one of our longtime Special Projects recipients, Aurora House. As Sheila Frost, administrative assistant for the House, explained, the House provides temporary housing for girls ages 13 to 17 who are experiencing significant difficulties in their family/school lives. All are referred by a court or Department of Human Services in Arlington, City of Alexandria, City of Falls Church or Fairfax County. The residents receive counseling, tutoring, and other assistance as needed so that they can address the problems they face. Ms. Frost emphasized the structured guidance and activities as well as the regular involvement of family members in the Aurora House programs.

Aurora House was dear to the heart of the late Leah Porzel, one of the founders of the House and a longtime AAUW Falls Church branch member; we as a branch have sponsored for several years an annual etiquette class for residents.

Members were reminded of the Special Projects guidelines and of the opportunity, with a March deadline, to apply on behalf of an organization benefitting women and girls for a small grant to be used for a purpose identified in the



application. Special Projects have provided NCCWSL fees for selected George Mason women, a college tour bus for AVID students at Stuart High School, support for a math and science workshop for Hispanic middle school girls, and many other efforts or institutions.

# Northern Virginia District Meeting Saturday, October 21<sup>st</sup>

The eleven branches of AAUW in Northern Virginia met at the George Mason Library to hear a presentation by AAUW's relatively new chief executive officer, Kim Churches, who joined our organization June 1<sup>st</sup>. of this year. Kim came to AAUW from the Brookings Institution, where she strategically guided the public policy organization, provided vision and problem-solving skills, expansive partnerships and external relations, and fundraising as the managing director.

**Prior to her Brookings experience Kim** was an associate vice chancellor at the University of Denver, and a director of development at the University of North Florida. Kim also has extensive experience working collaboratively on education (K–12 and higher education) as well as capacity building among grassroots groups and national and international nonprofits.

Kim earned her BA at Florida State University in English Education and the Certified Fund Raising Executive affiliation in 2002.

The meeting was well attended and participants were not disappointed in the lively presentation. Kim is an excellent speaker and freely interacts with her audience. One is impressed with her straight forward delivery and willingness to speak her opinion without hesitation.



Kim shared her vision of changes in the organization which seem necessary in order for our association to survive in future years. She sees a leaner organization with more collaboration among departments. Changes will definitely be coming. Kim pledged to keep members involved and informed throughout the process.

Kim has an added incentive for safeguarding the rights of women. She is the single mother of a daughter who will soon be ten years old.

After Kim's presentation with Q&A Caroline Pickens conducted a brief business for the Northern Virginia District before adjourning.

# **Public Policy News**

#### VIRGINIA FEDERAL LOBBY DAY

Seven AAUW members from Virginia who had not previously participated in Lobby Corps joined 31 regular Lobby Corps members on Capitol Hill on October 5 to encourage Senators to cosponsor the Patsy T. Mink Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA). The participants were divided into teams of two or three, and each team was tasked with visiting six Senate offices in an effort to garner cosponsors for this important legislation. Each of the 91 Senators who was not a cosponsor received a visit from one of the teams.

The GEEA provides more resources, training and technical assistance to educational entities to encourage and help them to meet the requirements of Title IX. Title IX is the provision of the Education Amendments of 1972 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in federally funded educational programs. This vital law affects all areas of education including: recruitment, admissions and housing; pregnant and parenting students; science, technology, engineering and math; sexual harassment and assault; and athletics. It applies to males as well as females, and its protections apply to staff as well as to students.

#### UPCOMING PUBLIC POLICY EVENTS

**Wednesday, December 6**, 2017, the League of Women Voters in Virginia will sponsor a Pre-Session Legislative Roundtable and Luncheon in Richmond. Representatives of nonprofit organizations and legislators will discuss issues of interest to women and their families that are expected to come before the General Assembly during the session which begins in January.

**Wednesday, February 7**, 2018, Virginia AAUW State Lobby Day. AAUW members from across Virginia will converge on Richmond and meet with their State Representatives and Senators to discuss legislative initiatives of importance to women and their families.

NOVEMBER Selection: AMERICAN NATIONS: A HISTORY OF THE ELEVEN REGIONAL CULTURES OF NORTH AMERICA by Colin Woodard An illuminating history of North America's eleven rival cultural regions that explodes the red state-blue state myth. North America was settled by people with distinct religious, political, and ethnographic characteristics, creating regional cultures that have been at odds with one another ever since. Subsequent immigrants didn't confront or assimilate into an "American" or "Canadian" culture, but rather into one of the eleven distinct regional ones that spread over the continent each staking out mutually exclusive territory. In American Nations, Colin Woodard leads us on a journey through the history of our fractured continent, and the rivalries and alliances between its component nations, which conform to neither state nor international boundaries. He illustrates and explains why "American" values vary sharply from one region to another. Woodard reveals how international differences have played a pivotal role at every point in the continent's history, from the American Revolution and the Civil War to the tumultuous sixties and the "blue county/red county" maps of recent presidential elections. American Nations is a revolutionary and revelatory take on America's myriad identities and how the conflicts between them have shaped our past and are molding our future.
