## **President's Letter**

Happy February everyone!

Well, the groundhog has told us to expect six more weeks of winter. However, this gives us an excellent opportunity to spend time together and learn how we can help those in our area to get off to or improve their salary-negotiating prowess. This is an important part of accepting a job that most women are not only not trained to do, but actually feel bad doing.

When I received my offer to start at Verizon, it was lower than what I had been making at the law firm, which I expected, but the amount of the gap was a concern for me since I was paying off loans and trying to save for a house. I contacted the person who made the offer and explained my challenges with the offer and remember hearing a little surprise in his voice, but also respect. (And heaven knows I was nervous about making that request.) I remember thinking I'd be happy if they just halved the difference, but the adjusted offer came back just about two percent less than I was making. This was important because all additional money at Verizon was based on my salary – long term incentives, yearly bonuses, plus additional pay increases – because it was all calculated as a percentage of my base. If I had settled for the lesser amount, I would have been at a disadvantage my entire career. We need to know how to help others avoid this misstep.

Also, please read the note from the Nominations Committee below. Have you been looking for an opportunity to get more involved? Have you been seeking ways to channel your talents to help others? Look no further than our Branch governance. We need you!

## **February 2018 Meeting**

In November, your Board voted to support with a substantial donation the AAUW workshops educating women about negotiating pay equity, WorkSmart and StartSmart. About that same time, we asked AAUW to speak at our February meeting about those programs--how they started, why they are considered successful, and especially what can be done to add Virginia to the now only four states offering these workshops to recent college graduates and career women. Both of these comprise the background to a February meeting you will not want to miss--and indeed may want to bring other AAUW branch members too.

It is an informative session, intended to raise awareness among not only branches but also with other stakeholders, such as our Partners in higher education.

Here's how we describe it to other branches and stakeholders in a recent email blast:

Want to learn more about these workshops? Want to learn how they began? How their success is quantified and verified? Want to include your branch members in that inquiry?

The Post is located at 400 North Oak Street in Falls Church, the meeting begins at 2:30 p.m., and we hope you all will join us for an informative session."

Since its formation in 1972, the Lobby Corps has made tens of thousands of visits to congressional offices, making AAUW a familiar and respected name among Members of Congress and their staffs.

Attending the training is a great way to learn more about Lobby Corps and how to become an integral part of AAUW's efforts to make a meaningful and significant impact on legislation pertaining to issues of concern to women and their families.


The Falls Church AAUW book clubbers have picked our selections for the Winter/Spring 2018 season. Here are the results:

#### FEBRUARY 20 Potpourri: A Wrinkle in Time by Madeleine L'Engle


It was a dark and stormy night; Meg Murry, her small brother Charles Wallace, and her mother had come down to the kitchen for a midnight snack when they were upset by the arrival of a most disturbing stranger.

"Wild nights are my glory," the unearthly stranger told them. "I just got caught in a downdraft and blown off course. Let me be on my way. Speaking of way, by the way, there is such a thing as a tesseract".

Meg's father had been experimenting with this fifth dimension of time travel when he mysteriously disappeared. Now the time has come for Meg, her friend Calvin, and Charles Wallace to rescue him. But can they outwit the forces of evil they will encounter on their heart-stopping journey through space?



#### MARCH 20 Bio: The Girl With Seven Names: A North Korean Defector's Story by Hyeonseo Lee



An extraordinary insight into life under one of the world's most ruthless and secretive dictatorships – and the story of one woman's terrifying struggle to avoid capture/repatriation and guide her family to freedom.

As a child growing up in North Korea, Hyeonseo Lee was one of millions trapped by a secretive and brutal totalitarian regime. Her home on the border with China gave her some exposure to the world beyond the confines of the Hermit Kingdom and, as the famine of the 1990s struck, she began to wonder, question and to realize that she had been brainwashed her entire life. Given the repression, poverty and starvation she witnessed surely her country could not be, as she

had been told "the best on the planet"?

Aged seventeen, she decided to escape North Korea. She could not have imagined that it would be twelve years before she was reunited with her family.

She could not return, since rumors of her escape were spreading, and she and her family could incur the punishments of the government authorities – involving imprisonment, torture, and possible public execution. Hyeonseo instead remained in China and rapidly learned Chinese in an effort to adapt and survive. Twelve years and two lifetimes later, she would return to the North Korean border in a daring mission to spirit her mother and brother to South Korea, on one of the most arduous, costly and dangerous journeys imaginable.


This is the unique story not only of Hyeonseo's escape from the darkness into the light, but also of her coming of age, education and the resolve she found to rebuild her life – not once, but twice – first in China, then in South Korea. Strong, brave and eloquent, this memoir is a triumph of her remarkable spirit.

MAY 15 History: Secrecy World: Inside the Panama Papers by Jake Bernstein

A two-time Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist takes us inside the world revealed by the Panama Papers, a landscape of illicit money, political corruption, and fraud on a global scale.

A hidden circulatory system flows beneath the surface of global finance, carrying trillions of dollars from drug trafficking, tax evasion, bribery, and other illegal enterprises. This network masks the identities of the individuals who benefit from these activities, aided by bankers, lawyers, and auditors who get paid to look the other way.

In <u>Secrecy World</u>, the Pulitzer Prize winning investigative reporter Jake Bernstein explores this shadow economy and how it evolved, drawing on millions of leaked documents from the files of the Panamanian law firm Mossack Fonseca--a trove now known as the



Panama Papers--as well as other journalistic and government investigations. Bernstein shows how shell companies operate, how they allow the super-wealthy and celebrities to escape taxes, and how they provide cover for illicit activities on a massive scale by crime bosses and corrupt politicians across the globe.

Bernstein traveled to the Caribbean, Latin America, Europe, and within the United States to uncover how these strands fit together--who is involved, how they operate, and the real-world impact. He recounts how Mossack Fonseca was exposed and what lies ahead for the corporations, banks, law firms, individuals, and governments that are implicated.

<u>Secrecy World</u> offers a disturbing and sobering view of how the world really works and raises critical questions about financial and legal institutions we may once have trusted.

#### **Movie Group**

Another is Wednesday is "Paid Your Dues" day at Cinema Arts theater when the admission is \$5.50 all day for folks over 55. Angelika does have a senior day special all day Thursday for \$8.

Several folks recently asked me about setting a movie date on a weekend – possibly a Sunday afternoon. So we started thinking about that possibility. We could start with one day a month to see how it goes.

Another idea is that the Book Club is reading <u>A Wrinkle in Time</u> by Madeleine L'Engle for the February selection.
