ERA UPDATE

On February 15, 2019, the Virginia State Senate passed SJ 284, which would ratify the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), by the substantial vote of 26 to 14! The measure was then sent to the House of Delegates where it was referred to the Privileges and Elections Committee. That Committee has not taken action on SJ 284, nor has it acted on HJ 579, the bill introduced in the House of Delegates to ratify the ERA. In order for ratification of the ERA by Virginia to become a reality, the House of Delegates must either pass the Senate bill by February 23 or pass its own bill by February 5 and send it to the Senate for passage by February 23.

VAratifyERA, a grassroots organization working on this issue, is asking anyone interested in ratification of the ERA by the Virginia General Assembly to call or email the House of Delegates leadership, asking them to ensure that the ERA legislation is brought to the House floor for a vote. 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Call or email even if you are not a constituent. They need to hear that Virginians across the State support ratification.

Legislation related to the ERA has also been introduced in the U.S. Congress. On January 25, 2019, in a bipartisan effort, Senators Ben Cardin and Lisa Murkowski introduced S. J. Res. 6, which removes the deadline for ratification of the ERA. Similar legislation, H. J. Res. 38, was introduced by Representative Jackie Speier on January 30, 2019.

Book Sorting

Sorting is our biggest effort staring in March. The job is pretty straightforward: cull the poor-quality books, sort the good books and box them by subject. Even a few hours of your time helps get the job done. Come to Mary Youman's (near Ballston at 4419 N. 18th Street) any time between 10am and 4pm on Saturdays in March. We sort in the driveway, so dress appropriately.

Wondering what we do with the money we earn? Well, our branch provides scholarships to local high school girls and grants to local organizations helping educate girls. We also donate generously to AAUW's Foundation.

The AAUW Foundation, which is the largest source of funding exclusively for graduate women in the world, supports aspiring scholars around the globe, teachers and activists in local communities, women at critical stages of their careers, and those pursuing professions where women are underrepresented.

Last year, AAUW awarded \$3.7 million in grants and fellowships to 241 scholars, researchers, and community-based programs.

Last year, our branch completed funding the endowment for a career development grant (\$75,000), this grant helps women return to university for education to advance their careers. This year's recipient of our branch's American Fellowship is Carol Daniel (George Mason University).



She is studying "The Effects of Nonviolent Everyday Resistance on Relations of Power in the Occupied Palestinian Territories." Carol Daniel identifies the unorganized and scattered forms of everyday nonviolent resistance practiced by Palestinians in East Jerusalem and the West Bank and investigates the extent to which these micropractices and discourses can undermine or influence Israeli occupation or existing power structures. She aims to conduct site observations and interviews with Palestinian activists and intellectuals in confrontation areas around the West Bank.

Book collection starts March 2





February 19th- History: March (March #1-3) by John Lewis




Congressman John Lewis (GA-5) is an American icon, one of the key figures of the civil rights movement. His commitment to justice and nonviolence has taken him from an Alabama sharecropper's farm to the halls of Congress, from a segregated schoolroom to the 1963 March on Washington, and from receiving beatings from state troopers to receiving the Medal of Freedom from the first African-American president.

Now, to share his remarkable story with new generations, Lewis presents March, a graphic novel trilogy, in collaboration with co-writer Andrew Aydin and New York Times best-selling artist Nate Powell (winner of the Eisner Award and LA Times Book Prize finalist for Swallow Me Whole).

March 19th- Classic: My Ántonia (Great Plains Trilogy #3) by Willa Cather



Through Jim Burden's endearing, smitten voice, we revisit the remarkable vicissitudes of immigrant life in the Nebraska heartland, with all its insistent bonds. Guiding the way are some of literature's most beguiling characters: the Russian brothers plagued by memories of a fateful sleigh ride, Antonia's desperately homesick father and self-indulgent mother, and the coy Lena Lingard. Holding the pastoral society's heart, of course, is the bewitching, free-spirited Antonia.

May 21st- Book by a Foreign Author: <u>Things Fall Apart (The African Trilogy #1)</u> by Chinua Achebe



THINGS FALL APART tells two overlapping, intertwining stories, both of which center around Okonkwo, a "strong man" of an Ibo village in Nigeria. The first of these stories traces Okonkwo's fall from grace with the tribal world in which he lives, and in its classical purity of line and economical beauty it provides us with a powerful fable about the immemorial conflict between the individual and society.

The second story, which is as modern as the first is ancient, and which elevates the book to a tragic plane, concerns the clash of cultures and the destruction of Okonkwo's world through the arrival of aggressive, proselytizing European missionaries. These twin dramas are perfectly harmonized, and they are modulated by an awareness capable of

encompassing at once the life of nature, human history, and the mysterious compulsions of the soul. THINGS FALL APART is the most illuminating and permanent monument we have to the modern African experience as seen from within.
