There she majored in Women and Gender Studies, with a focus on race, ethnicity, class and gender. Her research was on topics in visual representations of minority communities, love and intimacy. She has also done much research on The South Asian diaspora as well as the connections between communities of color in the states in media, literature and history.

Maryam was also given the opportunity to study abroad for a term in London at the School for Oriental and African Studies (SOAS) with courses on film, philosophy, history, Islam and South Asian dialects. Book Sale Success

Did you see all those smiles at the Book Sale Celebration Dinner? That's because we had our most successful sale EVER! Based on preliminary numbers our sales were \$25, 456!! We expect that after all bills are paid that we'll have a **profit of over \$23**, **300**.

Thursday was load-in day, which is really the hardest day of the sale. Despite the vast number of books that we had sold in bulk to the wholesaler, Mary Youman and Martha Trunk oversaw the loading of two truckloads of books from storage in the Youman's garage. On Friday and Saturday, that crew returned for various "shifts" of selling books and "neatening" the books. in the "Antiquarian" and "Specials" did their part to increase sales; they sold a box of books for \$550 and several more at \$50 each. You never know who is going to walk off the street into the book sale.

On Saturday afternoon, at exactly 4pm, the sale ended and the move-out commenced. The table-guys started breaking down and moving tables out of the gym. At the same time, the book sellers joined by Chuck and Rick Youman, as well as friends, and Justice HS volunteers moved books. They stacked those gaylords (large bins on pallets) five feet high, and the bulk book buyers rolled them out the door. Others started loading pickup trucks with shelving, etc. to go into storage. The last truck pulled out by 5:30pm. After Becky, Sharon Zackula & her husband, Jeff Rogers, unloaded them into the new storage unit, it was time to CELEBRATE. And time to thank the Youmans for more than 30 years of storing the books.

During the sale, we asked our customers for help in locating 400 square feet of low cost/no cost storage for our books so we can continue the sale, with another 400 square feet for sorting. We can't continue this successful fund raiser that funds the branch scholarships without space for the books. NOTE that space with flights of stairs will NOT WORK for us. The celebration dinner, organized by Marty Behr, was our chance to publically thank Mary and Chuck Youman for storing and caring for books for more than 30 years. As the book sale grew, so did their commitment. I remember sorting a few books in the Youman's living room, then storing them in their shed, then buying shelving to efficiently



The entire Youman family has pitched in at various times, in addition to Mary and Chuck, Rich has helped over his entire lifetime – maybe you saw him at the Move-out or at book sorting this year? Mary's daughter, Katie, helped all the way through college. Mary and Chuck have done so much more than house the books – to which we can attribute a large part of the more than \$300,000 we have donated to scholarships.

At the celebration dinner, we presented the Youmans with a picture book of the sale. But there is so much more that the book didn't capture. In addition to sacrificing their garage space, they have hauled tons of books from the Lantern Book Store in Georgetown; they (well, Rich) hauled bulk sale books to the street for pickup; they have received and culled books for all these years; they have actively publicized the sale everywhere they go; they have served lunch to hungry hordes of book sorters. And so many more forgotten things – like starting the "specials" section by looking up old books on ABE books, making labels for the various categories, making the first set of category signs, and the list goes on...

Book Sale Storage Needs

The Book Sale Task Force recommendations were approved to:

 Make explicit public appeals for assistance finding storage, labor and other help at our 2019 book sale, stating that the sale will not continue without such assistance.

- 2) Hold the sale through 2020 provided affordable, accessible storage can be obtained by an appropriate date in summer/fall 2019.
- 3) Draft written storage requirements (size, months, sorting space, ease of access during collection/donation periods and other logistics) prior to the 2019 sale.



May 21st Meeting



The Book Club does not meet in April, June, July and August. Our next meeting will be Tuesday May 21st at 7:30 PM at the Starbucks in Harris Teeter, 301 West Broad, Falls Church, VA 22046. Come and join the lively conversation and cookies whether you've read the book or not. May 21st Book by a Foreign Author: Things Fall Apart (The African Trilogy #1) by Chinua Achebe THINGS FALL APART tells two overlapping, intertwining stories, both of which center around Okonkwo, a "strong man" of an Ibo village in Nigeria. The first of these stories traces Okonkwo's fall from grace with the tribal world in which he lives, and in its classical purity of line and economical beauty it provides us with a powerful fable about the immemorial conflict between the individual and society. The second story, which is as modern as the first is ancient, and which elevates the book to a tragic plane,

concerns the clash of cultures and the destruction of Okonkwo's world through the arrival of aggressive, proselytizing European missionaries. These twin dramas are perfectly harmonized, and they are modulated by an awareness capable of encompassing at once the life of nature, human history, and the mysterious compulsions of the soul. THINGS FALL APART is the most illuminating and permanent monument we have to the modern African experience as seen from within.
