We will be meeting at 7:30 p.m. on November 11, 2019, at the Falls Church Community Center. We urge you attend to hear about girls' education in Fairfax County Schools, and to vote on an important issue regarding our branch's annual contributions to AAUW national funds.

November 2019 Speaker. AAUW's national leadership has adopted "four pillars" in their strategic plan, two of which are "Economic Security" and "Education and Training." Our November 2019 program features a speaker who is professionally focused on providing economic security and training to young women who are looking for "alternative" careers and training, and who do not wish to earn a traditional four-year degree at a college or are not able to do so.

Falls Church Branch Donations to AAUW National Funds. We need all members to attend and vote on which AAUW national funds will receive funding from the branch. The amount that has been set aside to make the donation equals 45% of the branch's net proceeds from the book sale. We will vote on how to allocate that 45% among various AAUW national funds.

Vote Nov. 5 and Let Your Voice Be Heard. In September, we heard about VAratifyERA's efforts to have Virginia be the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment. Make your voice heard on this and other important issues! VOTE on Nov. 5 for your senators and delegates. They will represent you in the Virginia House of Delegates and Senate for the next two years, and they will reapportion the state for the next *ten* years after the 2020 census!

Northern District of Virginia. The northern District of Virginia AAUW meeting was held on October 26, 2019, with Marion Jarret and the two of us attending from Falls Church. **All members are welcome to attend these meetings.** Several initiatives were discussed, including the Alexandria VA AAUW Intervention Initiative regarding Human Trafficking. Through the initiative, the branch intends to educate the community about human trafficking in our region, engage in advocacy and research, and develop an AAUW Angel App and Angel Alert. The Alexandria

branch requested support from all Northern Virginia branches as the Alexandria branch applies for an AAUW Community Action Grant. The Board of Falls Church has given our support.

The state's Diversity and Inclusion and the AAUW Five Star initiatives were also discussed. Finally, branches were reminded to make their contributions to national AAUW funds before the end of 2019, and to strongly consider providing at least some of their funding to AAUW's new fund, the "Greatest Needs Fund."

The Book Sale. We are having the book sale! We are announcing it to other AAUW branches and the public. We will begin receiving books and sorting books the first week of January 2020. Where: Willston Multicultural Center, 6131 Willston Drive, Falls Church, VA will be our new location for storing and sorting the books.

AAUW challenged itself to train 100,000 people in StartSmart/WorkSmart salary negotiations by August 22, 2019, and met the goal!! Now, AAUW has set a goal to train ONE MILLION people in StartSmart/WorkSmart in the coming years!

AAUW encourages all members to take the training and spread the word. The training is still available and the ability to negotiate on one's own behalf is always important.

AAUW writer Beth Haynes, a member of the Board of Directors said: "I thought I didn't need the training. I've been out of the workforce for more than 20 years. But then I started thinking about all of the ways that training in negotiations could have helped me in the last couple of years. I bought a new car. I helped my 93- year-old friend secure an apartment in an assisted living facility. I'm a certified parliamentarian and I have to negotiate contracts with groups who need parliamentary services." The bottom line is that much of life is a negotiation among friends, family or members of your community!

Public Policy

VAratifyERA spent the summer and fall educating Virginians about the importance of the Equal Rights Amendment to them. If the General Assembly votes for ratification during its 2020 session, Virginia would become the final (38th) state needed for the ERA to become law. The coalition is spending the final days before the election on November 5 in get out the vote activities in an effort to ensure that delegates who support ratification are elected.

AAUW of Virginia's Federal Lobby Day on October 17 was very successful. Over 30 AAUW members from across Virginia participated, including a number of women who were not Lobby Corps members. The participants visited all the Democrats and Independents in the Senate to thank them for cosponsoring the Paycheck Fairness Act. They also provided each office with AAUW's latest research on the gender pay gap for each state and congressional district. They asked the Senators to use AAUW's research to raise public awareness about the Paycheck Fairness Act, to encourage their Republican colleagues to support this important legislation, and to call for swift passage of the bill.
