The branch will not function without our efforts and contributions as volunteers. We are still looking for a person to be our **webmaster**. Voting. Every year is a political year in Virginia! This year in November we will elect the next Governor, Lt. Governor and Attorney General of the Commonwealth, and the House of Delegates. Participate! Vote! Take your friends to the Polls! On May 29, early in-person voting for the Democratic primary (there are no Republican primaries in our area) began at thirteen satellite locations in Fairfax County. June 5, 5 pm, is the deadline for early in-person primary voting and June 8 is the primary



Election Day. We will be considering, as part of our programming, opportunities to partner with other local organizations to foster awareness of the November election for our state government. We are lucky to have dedicated AAUW of Virginia Co-Vice Presidents for Public Policy, Susan Burk and Denise Murden. Save June 23 at 5:00 p.m. for a public policy discussion (via Zoom) with them. Burk and Murden have invited Kristina Hagen, Director of the Family Friendly Economy Campaign, to speak about this campaign, which AAUW of Virginia is officially supporting. AAUW National Election Results. The AAUW national election results were based on 28.6 percent of branch members and 8.0 percent of national members voting. AAUW's public policy priorities were approved by 92% of voters. In addition, Julia Brown was re-elected to serve as Chair of the board for a three-year term; Malinda Gaul was re-elected as board vice chair for a three-year term; and Elizabeth Haynes and Joseph Bertolino were re-elected to serve three-year board terms. However, the ballot initiative to eliminate the membership requirement got only 63% of the vote, just below the two-thirds vote needed to change the bylaws.

We look forward to seeing you at the June 14, 2021 picnic and meeting, our first meeting in person! We will be safe and social at the same time.

Falls Church AAUW Postcard Campaign Update –



We have wrapped up our postcards for re-registering voters in Virginia. FC AAUW wrote 1, 435 of the total 440,000 postcards written for Virginia Voter Registration. Now we are back at writing postcards to protect voting rights by once again joining a ROV non-partisan postcard campaign. This time we are writing postcards to Arizona voters of color to urge them to contact their Senator Sinema in support of HR1/S1, For The People Act to override the voter suppression bills in various states. Postcards and addresses will be available around June 1, and should be mailed by June 15.

If you are willing to write postcards for mailing before June 15, please indicate the number of postcards you are willing to write in the next few days. I'll prepare the packets and you can pick them up at my house (Mary Youman is temporarily off duty while recovering from knee replacement surgery).

Here's what ROV says about the postcards. "Arizona postcards. You will mail these cards as soon as written, deadline June 15 at the latest HR1/S1 For The People Act must pass to override the voter suppression bills, and protect democracy. A Senate vote will happen in July or August. Our nonpartisan postcarding in partnership with One Arizona will write to less-targeted voters of color to urge them to raise their voices to protect their vote, and contact Senator Sinema by phone or through our online portal where they can easily email, call or tweet to her."

AAUW/VA Public Policy Strategy Meeting

Mark your calendars for 5 p.m. on June 23 when the AAUW/VA's Public Policy Co-Vice Presidents will hold a Zoom meeting to discuss the November elections and Virginia's General Assembly session in 2022. All AAUW/VA members who are interested in public policy work are invited. Although the Virginia General Assembly will not convene until January 2022, it's not too early to begin planning AAUW/VA's strategy to ensure that legislation important to women and girls is considered in the 2022 legislative session.

The featured speaker will be Kristina Hagen, Director of the Campaign for a Family Friendly Economy, Virginia (<https://familyfriendlyeconomyva.org>). AAUW of VA is a member of this coalition, which works for paid family and medical leave, paid sick days, and quality, affordable childcare. **Watch your email for the Zoom link which will be sent out later this month.**

Book Club News





Venue: Kanopy



NOTE: As of June 30th Mary Riley will no longer be offering films through Kanopy. Please share any film you have enjoyed watching through Kanopy this past year.
