Book Sale Deferral. The book sale, deferred in April 2020, will not occur any time during 2020. This decision is based upon member responses to the Book Sale Participation Survey ("Survey"), current restrictions on group gatherings, current state orders to maintain social distancing, and other concerns related to the continued presence of COVID-19 and the challenges it is posing to group activities. We received approximately 25 responses to the Survey. Significantly, only one member responding to the Survey indicated that she would volunteer to perform all of the activities that would be necessary to prepare for and conduct a book sale.

The Board is hopeful that we may be able to safely conduct a book sale in April 2021. However, no final decision has been made, and any decision to commit branch resources to reserve space, rent tables, trucks, etc. store books and other items will be made as late as possible, and will be subject to change, if the government decrees or the Board and membership determine that we, collectively, do not feel safe gathering. At this time, the Willston Center

continues to store those books that we received and sorted as of mid-March 1. We do not know how long we will be able to store books with them.

Book Collection. We are not engaging in book collection. If you agree to receive books, you must store them at your house.

Storage Locker. We are no longer paying for storage. Several members are temporarily storing books and book sale equipment.

Please take a look at all the activities that are available to you. We look forward to seeing you on some of these online conversations!






