However, the space is indoors and is free of cost.

The Northern District of Virginia AAUW meeting will be held at Thomas Jefferson Library on October 26, at 1 pm. A representative from the national organization will give a presentation. Any member of the Branch is welcome to attend.

Our program for our October 14 meeting is also new. Dianne has reached out to One More Page, an independent bookstore here in Falls Church, and as it stands today, you need to come and be surprised!

2020 AAUW OF VIRGINIA STATE CONVENTION

Save the Date: April 17-19, 2020

Because 2020 marks the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in the United States, our conference will be themed around this momentous event and what's happened in advancing gender equity for women and girls in the past 100 years. The conference is being hosted by the Northern District at the Holiday Inn Hotel & Suites Alexandria - Old Town, 625 First Street, from April 17-19, 2020. The Winter/Spring 2020 issue of Vision will have the complete conference guide and registration information. However, King or Double Rooms are available for \$129 per night plus tax for April 17 and 18. Also, in case you want to build a mini-vacation around the conference, the hotel will offer the same rate for 2 days before and after these dates. The good news is that it's not too early to reserve a guest room if you plan on staying at the hotel. If you reserve now, you'll help us determine if we have to add additional rooms to our block before the hotel sells out for next spring. If you want to park in the hotel garage, ignore any references to \$20 per day for parking. The hotel is giving us a special rate of \$8 per night.

Public Policy News

Equal Rights Amendment Ratification



As you may recall, ratification of the ERA easily passed the Virginia Senate with a bipartisan vote in the 2019 legislative session. However, in the House of Delegates the effort to bring the Senate- passed measure to the floor, where it would have passed easily with strong bipartisan support, was defeated by one vote. Thus, VAratifyERA (a grassroots organization of which AAUW of Virginia is a part) is working hard to elect State Delegates who will vote for ratification of the ERA. As part of that effort, postcards are being sent to voters in 20 key

legislative districts. To date, 20,000 postcards have been sent, and the goal for October Is another 20,000. You, too, can be a part of this important work. Postcards, names and addresses, and a very short script will be available at the October 14 Branch meeting. Write, stamp, and mail a few postcards and become part of the effort to elect candidates who support ratification of the ERA!

A formal dedication of the seven completed statutes in the Virginia Women's Monument located in Capitol Square in Richmond will occur on October 14 from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The Women's Monument honors women who made significant contributions, often unrecognized, in a variety of ways over Virginia's 400-year history. When completed, the Monument will consist of 12 bronze statutes and a Wall of Honor inscribed with the names of 230 women. In 1982, Walker would publish what has become her best-known work, the novel *The Color Purple*. The story of a young black woman fighting her way through not only racist white culture but patriarchal black culture was a resounding commercial success. The book became a bestseller and was subsequently adapted into a critically acclaimed 1985 movie as well as a 2005 Broadway musical.

Her works typically focus on the struggles of African Americans, particularly women, and their struggle against a racist, sexist, and violent society. Her writings also focus on the role of women of color in culture and history. Walker is a respected figure in the liberal political community for her support of unconventional and unpopular views as a matter of principle.
