Public Policy

AAUW-VA Meets with Senator Saslaw

On Wednesday, October 20, Susan Burk, Co-Vice President for Public Policy; Sandy Lawrence, Northern District Representative; Linda Lawrence, a constituent of Senator Saslaw; and Marilyn Falksen, Public Policy Chair for the Falls Church Branch met with Senator Saslaw and his legislative aide, Janet Muldoon, to discuss two of AAUW-VA's key public policy priorities for the 2022 Virginia General Assembly: paid sick days for all of Virginia's workers and the establishment of a paid family and medical leave (PFML) program in the Commonwealth. The Senator chairs the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee, which must approve any legislation concerning these important issues before the bills can be considered by the Virginia Senate, so his support is crucial.



The meeting began on a positive note with the Senator stating he supported requiring businesses with 25 or more employees to provide up to 5 days of paid sick leave to their employees. This is a beginning step toward the goal of enacting legislation that will ensure all of Virginia's workers are able to stay home when they are sick. AAUW-VA is a member of Virginians for Paid Sick Days, a coalition that includes labor organizations, various advocacy and religious groups, and a small business organization; the coalition will be actively lobbying on this issue in 2022.

During the discussion of PFML, Senator Saslaw expressed concern about the potentially disproportionate impact such a program would have on small businesses. This led to a discussion among the participants, with AAUW-VA representatives describing how the pandemic has highlighted the need for PFML and the benefits of such a

program for employees and employers. They referenced the PFML study conducted by the Virginia Office of the Secretary of Commerce and Trade and the Chief Workforce Development Advisor last year that included descriptions of PFML programs in other states, showing how these programs varied in the manner in which they were implemented and funded. Additionally, they pointed out that the actuarial study authorized by the Virginia House in the 2021 session should be completed soon and

would provide the data necessary to begin developing such a program. As the discussion ended, Senator Saslaw said he was willing to consider proposals on this topic.

When asked what might happen in the 2022 Session to proposals to require employers to provide paid sick days to their workers and to establish a PFML program, the Senator said the key factor would be the outcome of the election on November 2.

Attendees came from beyond Falls Church, including Capitol Hill Lobby Corps and other Northern Virginia Branches. The Prom can be watched through Netflix streaming. All are welcome to join us. If you have any questions please call or text Aida at 703-966-8050.




Next up: All Aunt Hagar's Children: Stories

Edward P. Jones, a prodigy of the short story, returns to the form that first won him praise in this new collection of stories, *All Aunt Hagar's Children*. Here he turns an unflinching eye to the men, women, and children caught between the old ways of the South and the temptations that await them in the city, people who in Jones's masterful hands emerge as fully human and morally complex. With the legacy of slavery just a stone's throw behind them and the future uncertain, Jones's cornucopia of characters will haunt readers for years to come.

Tucker holds a bachelor's degree in political science from Butler University and a Juris Doctor from the Howard University School of Law. A former educator who witnessed the injustices of systemic inequity firsthand in her Houston, Texas classroom, she brings extensive experience to Alexandria. As a Texas bar-certified attorney, she was a legal analyst with Deloitte and Touche, a Freedom of Information attorney with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, a community organizer with Families Empowered, and an aide to several members of the U.S. Congress. She also served as the first East Region Project Manager for the Government Alliance for Race and Equity (GARE), a national network of governments working to achieve racial equity and advance opportunities for all. The City of Alexandria joined GARE in February 2019.
