Book Drive Ended March 31

Collection Bin at Community Center or Deliver to Youmans

Book collection...is about to end. March 31 was the last day! If you have someone still wishing to donate, tell them to hurry.

Donation is Easy. Deposit good, clean, saleable books in the book collection bin at the Falls Church Community Center before March 31. Or bring them to Mary Youman's (4419 N. 18th Street, Arlington) during book sorting on April 6 before noon.

Donations are 45% tax deductible. Value assigned by the donor. Our sale profits fund scholarships for local girls and AAUW's national scholarship program for women and girls. Because we don't have our 501c3 status yet, only the national portion is tax-deductible. But either way, when you donate a book, you help send a girl to college.

Guidelines for book donations. Our customers don't buy magazines, textbooks, encyclopedias, old reference books, or books that are damaged, moldy or in poor condition. So please explain to people that we accept only saleable books in good condition and remind them about the list of things we can't take. The other books, unfortunately, should be recycled.

Publicity

Publicity is key, because it draws paying customers. Pick up your posters and book marks at a sorting session and signup for a convenient location. Start distributing book marks NOW. And hang the posters the week of April 7.

This year we are trying to increase our online publicity. If your organization has an online presence, please copy and send the "blurb" below at the appropriate times and edit it as you wish.

At sale jobs

We have several different jobs at the sale. The two main jobs are selling and straightening books. Both are covered by the job title of Book Handler, signup with the link sent to you. Our greatest needs are for Friday around noon (11am – 3pm) and for sellers to help sell Specials (rare and new books) at any and all times on Friday and Saturday. Below are the job descriptions – remember you can switch between the jobs during your "shifts."

Neat books entice buyers to stay longer. So to keep things looking good, target a table that is fairly empty of buyers; smile and tell them what you are doing and go to it! --- Make sure the spines are all facing the same direction. Consolidate loose boxes by moving books from the floor or combining boxes. If there is space, spread out the boxes enough that people don't have to crowd to see them. The goal is to make the sale as easy and inviting for buyers as possible. This is the job for people who don't like handling money or want to exercise their inner neat-nic.

Selling books is what it's all about! The job is comparable to retail clerking with a cause. If you like books, people, or money, it's really rewarding. There are 70 distinct slots during the sale, so sign up for at least one shift using the signup genius link sent to you.

Volunteer for many jobs!

Remember, you don't need to limit yourself to just one job. We're recruiting people to help with almost 200 distinct tasks to prepare for and run the book sale. Sign -up by using the link sent to you by Signup Genius; the subject is: FC AAUW book sale 2018 Invite.

Are you wondering where our money goes? Well, our branch provides scholarships to local high schools girls and grants to local organizations helping educate girls. We also donate generously to the AAUW Fellowships.



AAUW is one of the world's largest sources of funding for graduate women, AAUW is providing \$3.9 million in funding for fellowships and grants to 250 outstanding women and nonprofit organizations in the 2018–19 academic year.

This year FC AAUW is co-sponsoring <u>Carol Daniel</u> in her Ph.D. on conflict analysis and resolution at George Mason focusing on nonviolent resistance. Her work is identifying the unorganized and scattered forms of everyday nonviolent resistance practiced by Palestinians in East Jerusalem and the West Bank and investigates the extent to which these micropractices and discourses can undermine or influence Israeli occupation or existing power structures. She aims to conduct site observations and interviews with Palestinian activists and intellectuals in confrontation areas around the West Bank.

Did you know that this year about 95% of our membership renewed! Our branch received a membership bonus award. Let's meet that standard again.

Now it is **time to renew your membership** for Fiscal Year 2019-2020, which starts July 1, 2019. Total dues are \$92. The national dues are \$59, state dues are \$15 and our local dues are \$18. There are two options for paying: online or by check.

Paycheck Fairness Act Passes House

Just in time for the celebration of Equal Pay Day, the symbolic date in 2019 when women's earnings finally catch up to what white men earned in 2018, the House of Representatives passed the Paycheck Fairness Act, H.R. 7 (PFA). The bipartisan vote was 242-187, with 7 Republicans joining all 235 Democrats in voting for the PFA. The bill is a much-needed update to the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and provides new tools to battle the pervasive pay gap and to challenge discrimination.

Specifically, the bill requires employers to prove that pay disparities between men and women are job-related and a business necessity. It bans the use of past salary history in determining an employee's pay, thus preventing prior wage discrimination from following an employee to future jobs. The PFA protects employees from being penalized for discussing their salaries, requires pay data collection, and supports salary negotiation skills training to give workers the tools to advocate for higher wages. Finally, it helps employers implement fair pay practices by providing technical assistance and has an exemption for small businesses.

Passage of the PFA during this Congress is a top legislative priority of the AAUW, and AAUW staff began working with Congressional offices and with coalition partners in January on the legislation. The AAUW Lobby Corps visited House offices several times to garner cosponsors for the bill and to ask Members to vote for it. AAUW members across the country sent thousands of letters and made hundreds of calls to their representatives to encourage passage of the bill. However, the work is not finished. The bill now goes to the Senate for consideration. AAUW staff and Lobby Corps will be working hard to encourage Senators to pass this important legislation. You, too, can be a part of this effort by writing to or calling Senators Warner and Kaine and urging them to vote for the Paycheck Fairness Act. If you have not already done so, you can also sign up to be a Two-Minute Activist and receive emails from AAUW about issues of importance to women and girls that are under consideration by the House and/or Senate. 

May 21st Book by a Foreign Author: Things Fall Apart (The African Trilogy #1) by Chinua Achebe THINGS FALL APART tells two overlapping, intertwining stories, both of which center around Okonkwo, a "strong man" of an Ibo village in Nigeria. The first of these stories traces Okonkwo's fall from grace with the tribal world in which he lives, and in its classical purity of line and economical beauty it provides us with a powerful fable about the immemorial conflict between the individual and society. The second story, which is as modern as the first is ancient, and which elevates the book to a tragic plane, concerns the clash of cultures and the destruction of Okonkwo's world through the

arrival of aggressive, proselytizing European missionaries. These twin dramas are perfectly harmonized, and they are modulated by an awareness capable of encompassing at once the life of nature, human history, and the mysterious compulsions of the soul. THINGS FALL APART is the most illuminating and permanent monument we have to the modern African experience as seen from within.

In principle and in practice, AAUW values and seeks an inclusive membership, workforce, leadership team, and board of directors. There shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of age, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, geographical location, national origin, race, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, and socioeconomic status.
