Co- Presidents' Message

Dear Members,

Happy New Year!

This week, I (Sharon) was thinking about being branch co-president. I'm tired of organizing and attending meetings, sending so many emails and announcements (& worrying that I should attend more meetings and send more information), and worse, watching changes in the law and policy related to so many issues that I care about apparently head south.

So, I decided to ignore all that and instead read the Sunday paper thoroughly. After many COVID articles, I found an obit, "*Karen Ferguson, 80, Lawyer Who Changed Pension Laws*," by Katharine Q. Seelye (NY Times, Jan 1, 2022, p. A16,

https://www.nytimes.com/2021/12/30/business/retirement/karen-ferguson-dead.html). I read on. Ms. Ferguson came to Washington DC after law school and, in the early 1970s, was a Nader Raider. She volunteered to work on pension law and "within a few short years, she became one of the country's foremost experts on pension law." (This quotation and all quotations following are from the obit.)



She founded the Pension Rights Center in 1976 with \$10,000 in funding from Ralph Nader, "who told her 'go make pensions an issue." Serving as director "for more than four decades, Ms. Ferguson successfully lobbied Congress for numerous pension reforms." "She also personally handled thousands of individual claims from people who had worked all their adult lives and found themselves being denied their full retirement benefits for one reason or another – corporate bankruptcies, say, or anticipated insolvencies, or chicanery." "She jump-started

a national grass-roots movement for better pensions in this country,' Karen Friedman, executive director of the center, said in an interview." "This included strengthening protections for widows and divorced spouses. Ms. Ferguson had been hearing from widows who weren't receiving benefits because their husbands, unbeknown to them, had signed away their rights. Ms. Ferguson helped draft, and fought for passage of, the Retirement Equity Act of 1984, which President Reagan signed into law. Among other things, it required qualified pension plans to provide automatic survivor benefits and allow for waivers only with the consent of both the participant and the spouse."

"Her son said that even in the last weeks of her life, Ms. Ferguson was on Zoom and on the phone with people who had lost their retirement benefits and had nowhere else to turn. 'She was a typical Washington workaholic,' he said. 'Here she is in the middle of dying and she's helping out this individual in any way she can. She did it because it was meaningful to her.'"



Ferguson's accomplishments are magnificent and far-reaching, and her dedication to providing a better life to millions is awe-inspiring. So, I guess I'm ready for a few more emails and re-energized for the fight.

Are you ready to rededicate yourself to fighting for changes in law, policies and practices to further the principles – equity, fairness, economic security -- that you think are important and are also part of AAUW's focus? Our January program will inspire you. As you will recall, one of our greatest successes as a branch in 2020 and 2021 was writing 11,000+ postcards for Reclaim Our Vote ("ROV"), a campaign urging voters to vote and people to register to vote. **On January 9, at 2 p.m.,** hear more about the impact of the ROV campaign from Roxanne Rucker, of ROV and Common Cause, at our FC AAUW branch meeting (via Zoom). We hope to see you on the small screen!

Also, in your planning for this year, please include AAUW. In February, the nominating committee will be nominating persons for the offices of President, Vice President - Programs, and Secretary. Pam Martinov also needs help publishing the newsletters. (She is publishing newsletters for 2 organizations right now!) Please say yes if the Nominating Committee gives you a call and asks you to serve as an officer.


Book Club News

FC AAUW Book Group Winter/Spring 2022 Line Up:

You recommended and you voted and here's what you chose for the first 5 months of 2022:

January 18-Play- Seven Guitars by August Wilson (7:00pm on Zoom)

It is the spring of 1948. In the still cool evenings of Pittsburgh's Hill district, familiar sounds fill the air. A rooster crows. Screen doors slam. The laughter of friends gathered for a backyard card game rises just above the wail of a mother who has lost her son. And there's the sound of the blues, played and sung by young men and women with little more than a guitar in their hands and a dream in their hearts. August Wilson's *Seven Guitars* is the sixth chapter in his continuing theatrical saga that explores the hope, heartbreak, and heritage of the African-American experience in the twentieth century. The story follows a small group of friends who gather



following the untimely death of Floyd "Schoolboy" Barton, a local blues guitarist on the edge of stardom. Together, they reminisce about his short life and discover the unspoken passions and undying spirit that live within each of them.


February 15-Science Fiction- Kindred by Octavia Butler



The first science fiction written by a black woman, *Kindred* has become a cornerstone of black American literature. This combination of slave memoir, fantasy, and historical fiction is a novel of rich literary complexity. Having just celebrated her 26th birthday in 1976 California, Dana, an African-American woman, is suddenly and inexplicably wrenched through time into antebellum Maryland. After saving a drowning white boy there, she finds herself staring into the barrel of a shotgun and is transported back to the present just in time to save her life. During numerous such time-defying episodes with the same young man, she realizes the challenge she's been given.

March 15- Book by a Nobel Prize Winner- Disgrace by J.M. Coetzee

Set in post-apartheid South Africa, J. M. Coetzee's searing novel tells the story of David Lurie, a twice divorced, 52-year-old professor of communications and Romantic Poetry at Cape Technical University. Lurie believes he has created a comfortable, if somewhat passionless, life for himself. He lives within his financial and emotional means. Though his position at the university has been reduced, he teaches his classes dutifully; and while age has diminished his attractiveness, weekly visits to a prostitute satisfy his sexual needs. He considers himself happy. However, when Lurie seduces one of his students, he sets in motion a chain of events that will shatter his complacency and leave him utterly disgraced.



April 19-Historical Fiction- The Paris Library by Janet Skeslien Charles


