## BRANCH MEETING AUTHOR AND SCHOLAR KATHY KLEIMAN, MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 12



Kathy Kleiman, founder of the ENIAC (Electronic Numerical Integrator and Computer) Programmers Project, historian, law professor and author of *Proving Ground: The Untold Story of the Six Women Who Programmed the World's First Modern Computer*, will be the featured speaker at the Falls Church Area September branch meeting. The program and meeting will be in person at the Falls Church Community Center, 223 Little Falls St., Falls Church, VA.

*Proving Ground* had its beginnings with the research Kleiman undertook as a Harvard undergraduate and a female programmer in search of role models. She discovered old photos from 1945 of several women who appeared to be programming what is heralded as the first general-purpose computer. She found little information about those women, and was told the women were most probably models. Her passion for finding the truth about these unrecognized pioneers eventually led to the founding of the ENIAC Programmers Project, a 2016 award-winning documentary about the women, and the book, released in July of this year.

"In *Proving Ground*," explains Kleiman, "I tell the ENIAC Programmers story in its full detail — from the ENIAC Programmers' education and attending college during the Depression, their recruitment by the Army during WWII to calculate ballistics trajectories to aim cannons and programming the enormous ENIAC computer for these trajectory equations without the security clearance to see the machine! These inspiring stories belong not just to me, but to everyone."

"We are thrilled to have author and scholar Kathy Kleiman as our featured speaker in September," said copresident Aida Loomis. "In addition to having a fascinating story to tell about the women who were the unsung developers and programmers of modern-day computers, Kathy Kleiman's work to remove barriers, reverse stereotypes and open doors for <u>everyone</u> to explore computing and STEM careers is inspirational. We hope that those who attend will bring their daughters, nieces, granddaughters, neighbors and friends – anyone who may need their eyes opened to the opportunities available in to them in this and other STEM fields."

Kathy Kleiman is a leader in Internet Law and Policy, and currently teaches at American University Washington College of Law.

The public is invited to attend this illuminating and inspirational program about the historic contribution of the women of *Proving Ground*.

Barnes & Noble will be on site to sell copies of the book at 7 pm, <u>30-minutes prior to the program</u>. Professor Kleiman will sign books following the program.

## A CORRECTION

I Was Wrong....

In our June newsletter, in recognizing and thanking Elizabeth Kessel, then Falls Church AAUW Co-President, as she stepped down, I (Sharon Zackula) lauded her for many contributions and her dedication to AAUW's public policy goals.

However, I wrongly stated that Elizabeth, in one of her prior roles as Secretary, established an archive for retaining Falls Church AAUW branch records at Mary Styles Riley Library. That credit goes to Sally Brett!

Sally initiated the retention of Falls Church AAUW records at the Mary Styles Riley Library (MSRL) at the time she served as President of the branch. Sally gave the AAUW papers to MRSL's "Virginia Room" because the AAUW was an important presence in the community, thanks to the work of many branch members. A little background: Sally was a professor of English at both East Carolina and Duke and her specialty was introducing students of writing to the university archives. She also was one of 12 faculty members nationally chosen for the Teaching Women's Literature from a Regional Perspective in 1979. She served as a Regional Coordinator thereafter. According to Sally, the "women's literature" that they accessed were diaries and letters in the university archives. Her ECU students produced a book. Her Duke students went on to work at advanced levels with manuscripts. Sally said that she loved introducing students to primary sources and came to understand that indeed the truth of history resides in the humble correspondence or diary of the ordinary person. And, that the truth about an organization can be found in its archives.

As a historian, Elizabeth also recognized the value of continuing the collection and retention of branch records for historic purposes, and was instrumental in building on the work Sally so thoughtfully began.

These records are available for review by anyone. Let us make sure that we continue to add to the archives at the Mary Styles Riley Library to include records of the many ways in which Falls Church AAUW has contributed positively to the Falls Church community!

come in multiples of 20). Also tell me where you will pick them up: two choices: Mollie/Lake Barcroft or Mary Youman/N. Arlington near Glebe Rd)

And tell me if you want stamps. We'll provide the rest: instructions, postcards, etc. So just tell me:

- number of postcards
- pickup point
- number of stamps, if any.

**More information:** For the general elections, these postcards prioritize infrequent voters who are likely not contacted by other groups, prioritizing areas with hotly contested races that could impact voting rights.

## GET OUT THE VOTES POSTCARDS PROGRESS REPORT

So far this calendar year (2022) alone, FC AAUW members have written 5,855 postcards for primaries in Texas, Alabama, and Florida and the election in VA. This number included the 1,020 cards we are writing for the Virginia general election to infrequent voters in neighboring Prince William County

**Why write postcards?** We write in honor of Kitty Richardson and to further AAUW's public policy priority to "support open and fair elections that are broadly accessible to all voters." We have written nonpartisan cards to minority voters in collaboration with Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) and Center for Common Ground, 501c(3) nonpartisan organizations.

ROV is leading an ongoing campaign to engage an increasing number of voters and is concerned about the numerous attempts across the country to roll back state laws that provided voters greater flexibility to vote in 2020. This year many campaigns have focused on infrequent voters.

## **REGISTERING VOTERS**

Registering voters is another important GOTV activity. On September 20, National Voter Registration Day, the Fairfax League of Women Voters will be registering voters at the Fairfax County Public Libraries from 1 to 4:30 pm and is looking for volunteers to assist in this important effort. If you are interested, you can volunteer for a two-hour shift by going to <u>Sign-Up Genius Link</u> to register. The LWV will provide volunteers with the materials needed and a pre-event orientation via Zoom. Volunteers will also be asked to complete a short online training prior to the event to ensure that they know just what to do. The link to the video is on the Sign-Up Genius website. It's quick to complete the training and get added to the State Department of Elections' list of individuals who can participate in third-party voter registration drives. Individuals who completed training in previous years need to retake training for 2022.



As death reaches into every household and villagers turn from prayers to murderous witch-hunting, Anna must find the strength to confront the disintegration of her community and the lure of illicit love. As she struggles to survive and grow, a year of catastrophe becomes instead annus mirabilis, a "year of wonders."
