On May 8, 2023, we recognized 17 highly accomplished young women at our May scholarship meeting.

Awarding these scholarships is fun and one of the activities that has defined us as a branch. The recipients, all Falls Church area graduating senior young women, have a bright future ahead of them. We hope the scholarships help them fulfill their dreams. They give us hope for the future. From Sharon: On May 18, we set up an experiment, a modified book sale, held the sale on May 19 and 20 and grossed approximately \$15,000. A wonderful result! Many thanks and a round of congratulations to the Book Sale chairs, Aida Loomis, Sarah John and Clare O'Sheel. Linda Lawrence, our Treasurer, also deserves our thanks and appreciation for working at the book sale nearly all hours it was open and making the runs with the funds. Thanks also to Mollie J for the early booksale tutorial, SignUp Genius assistance and other hours. To ALL who brought books, sorted them, helped set up the sale and smiled and took the money, thank you as well. Finally, thanks to the Loomis family members—Brad, Coleen and Julie--for so many hours of volunteer labor, including weekly trips to a used book store down the road to sell excess books.

We continue to look at fundraising ideas. Bunny Jarrett and Mary Ellen Gannon are organizing a jewelry and accessories sale. Please bring jewelry, purses and scarves in saleable condition to the dinner at Ireland's Four Provinces, where Bunny and Mary Ellen will collect them. We want to bring a movie to your attention that was identified by Aida for the Movie Group meeting on May 24. We think everyone who is interested in our public policy and our goals will find this movie, "Picture A Scientist," very interesting. It is on Netflix and available for 2-3 more weeks. In the documentary, leading women scientists discuss the inequalities they have faced. Some have seen some positive resolution. The movie includes a very useful graphic about sexual and gender discrimination that shows how such discrimination includes a wide range of behaviors beyond overt sexual overtures and rape. (See graphic on next page) One of the scientists featured is an MIT molecular biologist who raised a number of issues at MIT and became part of a group blessed by the MIT administration to gather data and publish their findings and recommendations. ## UPDATE FOR ON-LINE RENEWAL PROCESS FOR ANNUAL AAUW DUES

The membership department at National planned to send three separate notices to members encouraging renewal of membership using the online process before July 1, 2023.

The first notice went out April 24, 2023, but was not received by all members. According to Angie Cooper, AAUW National Membership Relations Manager, if you have ever "unsubscribed" from any AAUW mailings, this removed your name from the primary mailing list that Membership uses to send the renewal reminders. Please send an email to connect@aauw.org with your name, member no., and contact information to request that your name be added to the primary email list.

During a recent webinar, Ms. Cooper was made aware that some Falls Church Branch members had still not received the first notice even though an email had previously been sent to "Connect".

National has established a new procedure to ensure these emails are "worked" in a timely manner. If you have not renewed yet, look for a second reminder in your inbox in early June (no exact date). Please check your "spam" folders also.



Members can always renew without a reminder notice. Log-in to the AAUW.org website and access your "Personal Snapshot" page. Verify, correct or change any contact information and then click the "Renew" button at the bottom of your Snapshot. This takes you through a simple process utilizing a credit card for payment. A confirming email receipt will be sent for your records.

## APRIL MEETING

## **USED BOOK SALE SUCCESS!**



Faced with greatly reduced fundraising options after a decision last spring to discontinue the annual used booksale, and the desire to continue providing scholarships, it was proposed in February that the branch resurrect the book sale on a smaller scale and in partnership with the Village Preservation and Improvement Society looking to downsize their own annual fundraising event. Based on the offer of free storage space by Beyer Automotive we planned to



collect and manage 20% of last year's book volume over the course of only three months, to reduce the number of genres, and to limit selection within those genres to only those in pristine condition. Our goal was to raise \$6000 and ensure a 2024 scholarship fund.

It worked! With 20% of the volume in books we grossed half of last year's gross sales income with a whopping \$15,000, and after expenses will be able to contribute more than \$11,000 to the education fund.

In addition, we added two new members during the sale with the possibility of three more.

#### POSTCARD WRITING FOR VA PRIMARY IN CHESAPEAKE CITY

For the Virginia primaries, we are writing get-out-the-vote postcards to registered Black women voters in Senate District 18 to alert them to this crucial primary. And this one aligns with many of AAUW's objectives. Check out the message!

In Chesapeake City, a majority/ minority district, 80% of BIPOC voters do not generally vote in primaries, leaving women underrepresented in the General Election. Primary voting promotes consistent voting habits, and greatly increases the likelihood of voting in the fall. Our postcards inform voters of where and when to vote, and key issues at stake.

Dear Ms. Jones, In the June 20 primary, voters choose: Senator Louise Lucas or Senator Lionell Spruill Vote Bring place label her Early riends! CHOOSE who best represents You on women's rights, women's health, & jobs, to run in November. Your voice matters! Sincerely, anna, volunteer, Reclaim Our Vote

As always, our postcards are non-partisan, mentioning both

candidates by name. But you may be aware that the two SD18 primary candidates have shown distinctly different records, issues, and behaviors. FYI, one of the candidates, Louise Lucas, is the first Black and first female President Pro Tem of the VA State Senate. If elected, she would also be the first Black and first female Chair of Finance and Appropriations in the Commonwealth of Virginia, again making history.

Find out if your locality is voting in the June 2023 <u>Primary Election</u>. Or, contact your local <u>voter</u> <u>registration office</u> for more information.

Deadline to apply for a ballot to be mailed to

you: June 9, 2023. Your request must be received by your local voter registration office by 5:00 p.m.

Voter registration offices open for early voting: Saturday, June 10, 2023.

The last day of in-person early voting at your local voter registration office: Saturday, June 17, 2023 at 5:00 p.m.

See who is on your ballot by viewing the candidate lists.

Register to vote or apply for an absentee ballot online using the <u>Citizen Portal</u>.

Be sure to vote. Our elected officials routinely make decisions about issues that directly impact all of us. Remember, our vote is our voice!
