Dear Members,

Happy February! The days are getting longer.

A very big round of applause for Susan Conklin. Thank you, Susan, for the fantastic meeting in January, when **Suzanne S. LaPierre, co-author**, *Desegregation in Northern Virginia Libraries*, (2023), spoke to us about the recent history of the desegregation of Northern Virginia's public libraries. Susan has also planned a very interesting program for **Sunday afternoon**, **February 11**, **2024**, **2:00 p.m.**, **at the Falls Church Community Center**. Come a few minutes early to see old and new friends. Then listen to our panel of three women entrepreneurs – Mala Persaud, Anna Gallman and Tiffany T. Laing – that Susan has arranged. As we look at 2024, we want to remain a dynamic organization, to engage, to persuade, to have fun and to be purposeful. But, action is required, even when the weather is bleary and the days are short. "We will fail when we fail to try," Rosa Parks said. We can make a difference if we plan and act together, advocating with sustained focus for issues and legislative changes we believe are necessary to achieve AAUW's goals for women and families. **AAUW Lobby Corps**, a program led by the AAUW national office, is soliciting more of us to participate in lobbying the U.S. Congress on important issues, such as pay equity, paid leave, education funding, Title IX, voting rights, criminal justice reform and others. **Lobby Corps training will occur (online via Zoom), Feb 8, 2024. Sign in either to the 9:30 a.m. or the 5:30 p.m. session** and see if this is an area where you can engage and persuade, have fun and be purposeful.

AAUW Falls Church and other Virginia branches also lobby our state legislators for positive change. Several members have just returned from Richmond, VA after meeting with VA state Delegates and Senators on January 30 (a reception for women legislators), and January 31, 2024, at their offices at the Capitol. We addressed issues and legislative proposals regarding childcare, maternal health, minimum wage, paid family and medical leave, paid sick days, public meeting access, public school funding, reproductive rights, salary history ban, and workplace equity. Continue the effort – follow and engage with the AAUW VA Public Policy chairs during the rest of this year, tracking issues and legislation and contacting your legislators.

FC AAUW Nominating Committee and March Meeting. We have three thoughtful members working together to create a slate of officers for next year. Anne Baxter, Marion Jarrett and Dianne Bodeen are the Nominating Committee, and are identifying candidates for three offices that will be voted upon at the FC AAUW branch's annual business meeting on Monday evening, March 11, 2024, at 7:30 p.m., at the Falls Church Community Center. We will elect a President (or co-Presidents), a Vice President-Programs (or co-VPs) and Secretary. If you are asked by the Nominating Committee to be nominated to serve as one of these officers, please take a moment to consider how much your contribution would mean to the branch as an officer. And, say yes, if you can.

PUBLIC POLICY UPDATES

Virginia General Assembly



The Virginia General Assembly convened on Wednesday, January 10, and elected the first Black Speaker of the House of Delegates in Virginia's history, Delegate Don Scott. Several key bills supported by AAUW have already been introduced. Bills pertaining to **reproductive rights and maternal health**: a Constitutional Amendment on reproductive freedom, protection from searches of menstrual

data, prohibition of extradition to other states for violation of their laws pertaining to reproductive health care, a right to contraception, implicit bias training requirements; **economic security/workplace equity**: paid family and medical leave, paid sick days, minimum wage increase, childcare review, salary history ban; **education**: Title IX/sexual harassment training, studies on teacher compensation and retention; **LGBTQ**: Constitutional Amendment for right to marry, right to gender affirming care.

AAUW-VA Lobby Day was held on January 31. (As of the date of this article was written (January 28), five Falls Church Branch members were planning to attend. POSTCARDS FOR ROV

Get out the vote postcard writing will resume in 2024!

Falls Church AAUW has been writing **non-partisan** postcards to minority voters in conjunction with Reclaim our Vote (ROV) and support of AAUW's policy of "Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and expanding voting rights."

Our postcards via ROV comprise a nonpartisan **voter outreach campaign to fight voter suppression** in states that have been severely impacted, empowering underrepresented voters to fully participate in elections. Our postcards invite citizens to reregister and vote in important federal and statewide elections.



In 2023, we helped ROV reach 99% of the 287,000 Virginia voters identified as belonging to underrepresented groups. The efforts paid off: voters sided with candidates that supported protections for voting rights, women's health, and the environment. Falls Church branch wrote 2,198 postcards for the VA fall election (primary and general elections), bringing our grand total to 20,588 since 2020. And here we go again...

What's in store for



No doubt you are well aware that in 2024 we'll be facing a Presidential election, Congressional elections, and a host of state and local races. The 2024 elections are arguably even more important than 2020's, in terms of what's at stake. As always, turn-out will be the key to preserving our democracy. So refill your pens and limber up your fingers.

These are the campaigns that we'll be writing post cards (that have been identified so far): GEORGIA: Primary postcard campaign launches on February 23.

- U.S. Congressional District 13
- Mailing window: May 1-6
- 10-14 days of early voting
- Primary on May 21, 2024

VIRGINIA: Primary postcard campaigns launch on March 1.

- U.S. Congressional Districts 7 and 10
- Mailing window: May 7-21
- Early voting: May 3-June 15
- Primary on June 18

More campaigns will be announced as races develop.
