PUBLIC POLICY UPDATES

Lobby Day

This year's AAUW-VA Lobby Day in Richmond was a huge success. Over 30 members from across Virginia reached out to nearly 80 legislators on Wednesday, January 31. The day started with a briefing by the AAUW-VA Co-VP's on the status of legislation pertaining to the organization's public policy priorities -- reproductive rights, maternal health, electronic meetings, paid family and medical leave, paid sick days, salary history ban, workplace discrimination and harassment, and pubic school funding. After the briefing, members visited the offices of two or three assigned legislators to share information about these priorities and to ask that the legislators support or oppose specific bills. After these meetings, AAUW-VA members were introduced to the General Assembly from the visitor galleries on both the Senate and House sides of the historic Capitol Building. The Falls Church Area Branch was ably represented at Lobby Day by Sharon Zackula, Becky Gaul, Marilyn Falksen, Bonnie Krajeski, and Kate Aubert.

The evening prior, the Falls Church contingent joined other AAUW-VA members at a Women Legislators Reception which gave them an opportunity to meet legislators, aides, and some of AAUW-VA's public policy partners in a more relaxed setting.

Virtual Lobby Day

AAUW-VA also scheduled a Virtual Lobby Day for February 28. The event, with AAUW-VA Co-VP's for Public Policy Denise Murden and Janine Greenwood, provided legislative updates and answered questions. As part of the day's activities, participants were asked to contact both their Virginia State Senator and Delegate by phone or email, post about our issues on social media, and/or write a letter to the editor of their local newspaper about one or more of our public policy priorities. Murden and Greenwood provided the messages participants need to send to their legislators on the key issues that must be dealt with before the Session ends on March 9.

General Assembly Action

This article is written on February 27, and less than two weeks remain until the 2024 General Assembly is scheduled to adjourn. However, there is still much to be accomplished. The Senate and House have passed versions of the 2024-2026 budget, both of which include much-needed additional funding for schools. The two bills must now be reconciled, and the resulting budget language sent to the Governor for his consideration.

Several items on AAUW-VA's public policy priority list have passed or are expected to pass the General Assembly and be sent to the Governor for his signature or veto, including salary history ban, paid family and medical leave, raising the minimum wage, menstrual data privacy, right to contraception, allowing certain nonelected public bodies to hold additional virtual meetings, requiring employers to inform workers of their rights to file a charge of discrimination within 300 days after an alleged unlawful discriminatory practice occurred, and allowing local communities to raise revenue for the purpose of building or repairing a local school.

Lobby Corps

AAUW Lobby Corps is an active group of women who go to Capitol Hill once a month – typically the third Thursday of the month – for two hours to advocate for legislation that advances equity for women and girls. RECLAIM OUR VOTE REACTIVATED!

Falls Church AAUW is now launching our 2024 nonpartisan, get-out-the-vote efforts by writing postcards for the GEORGIA primaries. As usual, we are joining Reclaim Our Vote's <u>ROV</u> campaign to increase Black voter participation. In past years, we have written THOUSANDS of postcards, so don't be shy, sign up now.

How can you participate? Just respond to this email or send an email ("postcard" in the title) to <u>MollieJewell2@gmail.com</u> with the:

1. number of cards you want to write (multiple of 20, please)

2. number of stamps you need, if any

3. pickup location. Mollie Jewell (3715 Tollgate Terr, Bailey's Crossroads), Mary Youman's (4419 N. 18th Street, near Ballston), or Book sorting at Don Beyer's old showroom on Sat. mornings.

What are we doing? For these cards, we will be writing to Black voters in GA. As a nonpartisan organization, we aren't telling people whom to vote for, but we can let them know that a primary is happening, and we can encourage them to vote. Voting in the primary increases the chances that a person will vote in the general election -- and that is our ultimate goal.

- Mailing window: April 22 May 9. Please do not mail Georgia postcards until April 22.
- Early voting in GA: April 29-May 17
- GA Primary on May 21, 2024.

Why is this so important? In voter suppression states, legislators have passed laws making it harder for people to vote, especially voters of color.

ROV gives voters of color the information they need to cast their ballot despite barriers to voting with personalized postcards (and phone calls and text messages).

Redistricting as a result of the 2020 census opens up potential power shifts, which could threaten or protect voting rights, education, women's health, economic equality, and many other issues.

We contact ALL voters of color in the states we work in. By all voters, we mean not just the voters who vote every year but every registered voter who has a chance to cast a ballot because we know every voice deserves to be heard!

*Cull: We will no longer accept reference materials, textbooks, sociology, religion, self-help, philosophy, or magazines and books that are damaged, moldy and in poor condition. Books that are not used for the sale will be donated to VPIS and they will haul away. Only want books in prime condition and are marketable.

*Identify Potential Specials: These are hardbacks that can sell for more than \$4 or paperbacks for more than \$3. Generally, these are books in excellent condition such as coffee table books, best sellers, recent editions (2020 or newer), first editions of bestsellers, rare or old books. Put them in Clare's Corner for individual pricing.

*Sort by Category and Brick Accepting in the following categories:

- FICTION
- NON-FICTION
- CHILDREN'S
- COOKBOOKS

The book selection is the 1929 publication of **ALL QUIET ON THE WESTERN FRONT** by Erich Maria Remarque. Since the publication of the book there have been three film versions, including the one we are focused on. The 1930 American adaptation won two Academy Awards. The 1979 British-American adaptation, a television film, won a Golden Globe and an Emmy. Feel free to watch those as well. The book is also available as a graphic novel if that is your preference.

We will be meeting in one of the study rooms at the Mary Riley Styles Library on March 20th at 6:30 PM. Please make note of the different dates and times. The library closes at 8 so we should be done relatively early. We will also send a Zoom link. Hybrid is new to many of us but will be a great opportunity to learn what is available to us as a group.
