On Sunday, October 13, our program speaker will be Rebecca Davis, who, with her brother, Peter Davis, produced the documentary: "*Join or Die*". Both Rebecca and Peter grew up in Falls Church, attending schools here in the city. We hope that you will **join** us, pun definitely intended.

The film derives some of its focus from a book, published almost 25 years ago, *Bowling Alone by Robert Putnam.* It seems like a timely topic, not only for our membership, but for our community at large; we have also invited the McLean AAUW to attend.

From the New York Times Review:

In the wake of the 2016 election, a new type of film briefly emerged: the liberal "how did we get here" documentary. It doled out insights and visited with "ordinary" folks across the country to take the temperature of the political divide.

"Join or Die," directed by the siblings Rebecca Davis and Pete Davis, recalls those postelection films.

Narrated by Pete and essentially framed as a plea to save the United States, it centers on the work of Robert Putnam, an academic who has dedicated his life to arguing that American civic engagement is in decline.

Putnam articulated his thesis in "Bowling Alone," first published as an article, and then in 2000 as a book.

The film, which is longer than our meeting time will allow, will be available via link, 72 hours before October 13 meeting. PUBLIC POLICY UPDATES



Report from Diane Schrier

AAUW-VA's VP for Public Policy, Diane Schrier, has prepared a report about the importance of the upcoming elections in November. It also includes a discussion of the education accountability standards initiated by the Virginia Board of Education, and the serious consequences these new standards will have for public education in Virginia. She has asked that every Branch member read her report, which follows:

Early voting has started in Virginia. Election Day is Nov. 5 and there is Saturday voting. It is very important this year to either register early or doublecheck your registration. This can be done by going to elections.virginia.gov. Over 6,000 voters have been removed in Virginia this year and as always, mistakes can be made. The last day to request an absentee ballot is Oct. 25th. However, any ballots mailed in during the last two weeks of October stand a chance of not arriving on time. This is due to the reorganization of the postal system in Virginia.

The Virginia Board of Education recently initiated new education accountability standards, known as the School Performance and Support Framework. To be diplomatic, they are a disaster to all Virginia schools, especially to Northern Virginia, where there is a large influx of pupils speaking different languages. In Alexandria alone, 127 languages are spoken in school.

Among the ill-advised actions is the forcing of foreign students, not speaking English, to take the SOL after only 3 semesters or 1½ years and to have it count in the school's ratings. All the very best educational research shows it takes approximately 3 years to develop social fluency and 7 years to develop academic fluency. That is 6 and 14 semesters respectively.

School work courses have been advanced and accelerated and while this works for some students, all students develop at different speeds. To force students to fail would again reduce school ratings, and more importantly

cause students to become disheartened and leave school. It also requires additional course certification for teachers, but without any additional recompense. Virginia teachers are already being paid far below average. Last year the General Assembly attempted to rectify the situation, but unfortunately the bill did not become law. Additionally, there is no additional funding that would help the schools fulfill the new requirements.

According to the Board, it is expected that due to these provisions 50-70% of Virginia schools would fail. That would open up a very wide door to have the government step in, and as has happened in other states, close public schools and turn them over to charter institutions. These institutions have no accountability in other states, for they are owned by corporations, as one State Senator said on television. Additionally, as they take money from public education, they would force special needs, low-achieving and students that don't benefit their image to have an inferior education. They have in other states raised the tuition costs higher than the state vouchers, also forcing students into underfunded public schools.

Also, if any district has one-quarter of its schools failing under these new VDOE regulations, the government can step in and take over the whole district.

It is imperative this year that everyone be aware that how you vote in the National Elections will be important in what occurs in Virginia next year.

General Assembly Looking at Changing School Funding Formula

Virginia currently uses a complicated formula for school funding that was first adopted in the 1970s and has not been changed. According to a study done by the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC), which conducts program evaluation, policy analysis, and oversight of state agencies on behalf of the Virginia General Assembly, this formula has left school districts severely underfunded. The Joint Subcommittee to Study Elementary & Secondary Education Funding, a bipartisan group of legislators under the leadership of Senator Mamie Locke are looking at ways to update and simplify the formula, which could take several years to accomplish. Senator Locke has indicated she is looking to roll back some 2008-recession era changes such as the cap on how much support staff a school district can hire now that the state is no longer in a recession. It appears that both Democrats and Republicans are open to changes in the formula as long as they don't adversely affect the schools their districts. The Subcommittee will next meet on October 31. Senator Locke has promised statewide comment sessions as the proposals begin to take shape.

Lobby Corps

Because Congress will not be in session, Lobby Corps will not meet in October. Check your November *Flash* for information about when Lobby Corps will resume.

Candidate Forum for Congressional Candidates

On **October 7 at 6 pm** The Arc of Northern Virginia will be hosting a candidate forum for the candidates for the seats in the US House of Representatives in districts 7, 8, 10 and 11. This will be a live online forum held via Zoom. For more information and to register click **Congressional Forum**. This is a nonpartisan event. In line with the mission of the Arc, the event will focus on disability rights issues and policies.

Let's Go to the Movies


