



How Gilded Age Journalist Eliza Scidmore Gave Washington Its Famous Cherry Blossoms

Born just before the Civil War, Eliza Scidmore broke gender barriers as a prolific newspaper correspondent, a globetrotting travel writer from Alaska to Asia, and the National Geographic's first female photographer and board member.

Local author Diana Parsell will describe how she uncovered Scidmore's long-overlooked story and her legacy as the visionary behind Washington's beloved Japanese cherry blossoms.

Diana Parsell is a writer, editor and former journalist, and the author of Eliza Scidmore: The Trailblazing Journalist Behind Washington's Cherry Trees. In a 40-year editorial career she worked for many publications, including National Geographic and The Washington Post, and for several major science organizations in Washington and Southeast Asia. A resident of Falls Church, she did much of her research at the Library of Congress and now volunteers there as a docent for public tours.

PUBLIC POLICY UPDATES



General Assembly

Last month's *Flash* mentioned that this Session of the General Assembly passed several bills support by AAUW and sent them to the Governor for his review. Unfortunately, most did not survive the Governor's veto pen.

He vetoed bills establishing a paid Medical and Family Leave insurance program; paid sick leave for all public and private employees in Virginia; raising the minimum wage to \$13.50 in 2026 and \$15 in 2027 and eliminating the exemption from the minimum wage for farm employees and temporary foreign workers.

He also made amendments to the bills requiring cultural competency and unconscious bias training for renewal of a medical license and providing a right to obtain and use contraception, which significantly change the effect of the legislation. With the current make-up of the General Assembly, it is unlikely the members will be able to override any vetoes, so the bills will not become law. Also, the General Assembly is likely to make changes to his amendments, which the Governor will not accept, and these bills, too, will not become law.

Although this was not one of the bills that AAUW-VA actively supported, one positive measure of interest to women in Virginia signed into law amends the Virginia Consumer Protection Data Act to prohibit the collection, disclosure, sale, or dissemination of consumer reproductive or sexual health data without consent. The legislators return to Richmond on April 2 to consider the Governor's action on bills they passed and to work with him on a budget. The Governor made 205 amendments in the budget proposed by the General Assembly, and these changes will need to be negotiated to obtain a final budget.

RECLAIM OUR VOTE POSTCARDS

Thank you to the 22 branch members who have signed up to write GOTV postcards to Black voters in Prince William County. Wow, we are off to a great start! And I will be ordering more cards for some late entries. Meanwhile, ROV analysis show that our postcards increase voter turnout by 7%!

Rationale for postcards: Our audience is registered Black voters who did not vote in 2023 elections, to urge voting in VA's primaries for Lt. Gov, AG, and (for some), House of Delegates. Primary voters are much more likely to vote in General Elections. Our script must remain nonpartisan, as we are a 501(c)3 nonprofit.

Let's Go to the Movies

Susan is on vacation this month, but there is one good soon-to-be-released movie you may want to check out: "Four Letters of Love", based on the best-selling novel of the same name by Irish author Niall Williams. It is being released on April 25 to movie theaters in the US.




Nicholas (Fionn O'Shea) and Isabel (Ann Skelly) are made for each other, but fate does not always choose the easiest path to true love. As destiny pulls them together, so do family, passion, and faith drive them apart. Nicholas' father, William (Pierce Brosnan), comes home one day to shatter his family's quiet, modest life. He tells them that in a moment of divine intervention, God has instructed him to dedicate his life to painting. He quits his job and sets off for the coast, leaving his shell-shocked wife and son to fend for themselves. Meanwhile Isabel and her family live a charmed existence on a nearby small neighboring island, their house full of music and poetry. When tragedy strikes and her brother suffers a terrible accident, the music stops, and Isabel's parents (Helena Bonham Carter, Gabriel Byrne) decide in their grief to send Isabel to a convent school on the mainland. The young lovers embark on their own individual journeys of heartache and misplaced love, before fate contrives to pull the threads of their lives together. When they meet, it will be like a miracle.

Williams is a magnificent writer and has also written the screenplay for the movie. I can't wait!

I've seen and can recommend **Black Bag**, which is still playing at Cinema Arts in Fairfax. It's an old fashioned, "thinking" spy thriller more in the fashion of John LeCarre than James Bond and starring Michael Fassbender and Kate Blanchett. Also, the preview for **The Penguin Lessons** was fun, and it received a 4-star review in Rotten Tomatoes. It's a family-friendly movie set in Argentina in the 1970s and explores themes of aging, cynicism, and the importance of love. It too is playing at Cinema Arts.




