PUBLIC POLICY UPDATES

Virginia General Assembly

The Virginia General Assembly reconvened for a one-day session on April 2 to review the vetoes and amendments made by the Governor to the Budget and legislation they had sent to him. Unfortunately, the legislators were unable to override any the Governor's vetoes. The General Assembly accepted some of his amendments to the Budget and legislation but rejected most of them. The Budget and the bills are now awaiting the Governor's action on changes made by the General Assembly. Although the General Assembly did adjourn, the Senate did not adjourn sine die, so legislators can come back into session without the Governor calling them if they need to address economic and other issues caused by actions taken by the President.

The next Lobby Day is May 8. In June Lobby Corps is considering a June 12 Lobby Day and inviting National Board Members and interested new people to participate. If this occurs, there probably will be a Zoom training the prior Thursday (June 5). For questions and more information about Lobby Corps, contact Becky Gaul, beckygaul@verizon.net.

GET OUT THE VOTE POSTCARD INITIATIVE

Thank you to all who have signed up to write GOTV postcards to Black voters in Prince William County. Wow, we are off to a great start in 2026! Postcarding for the VA primaries is now wrapping up; cards should be mailed by May 30. Meanwhile, **ROV analysis show that our postcards increase voter turnout by 7%!**



For the statistics, **we wrote 1,180 postcards for VA primaries and have written 30,258 since we started!** Next up will probably be the general election in VA.

Last round of postcard writing for VA primaries

One more round of postcarding before the Virginia primaries! If your fingers aren't too tired, I think there's enough time left - these cards need to out the door by May 30. And there will be more opportunities for Virginia primaries and general elections upcoming. Meanwhile, the Center for Common Ground/ROV postcards is urging action at the state and local levels.

To sign up contact Mollie by noon Tuesday, May 6 with the number of cards (multiples of 20), and stamps (\$.56 each), and one of the following pickup locations:

- Mollie Jewell's (3715 Tollgate Terr, 22041. Off Columbia Pike between Bailey's crossroads and Annandale
- Mary Youman's (4419 N 18 St. Arlington, near Ballston)

Rationale for postcards: Our audience is registered Black voters who did not vote in 2023 elections, to urge voting in VA's primaries for Lt. Gov, AG, and (for some), House of Delegates. Primary voters are much more likely to vote in General Elections. Our script must remain nonpartisan, as we are a 501(c)3 nonprofit.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



Graham Road Elementary School --Title 1 School

Interested in giving back to our community and help level the playing field in education? Let me suggest volunteering at Graham Road Elementary School (GRES). Volunteers may work on an ad hoc basis or recurrent basis, whatever is convenient.

Help is needed in the following areas:

- Assistance in the school library
- Helping at the book fair
- Weekend food packing
- Sorting clothing in the “clothing boutique”
- Donating new or gently used children’s clothing
- Helping the PTA with their activities such as Teacher Appreciation Week and Fall Festival
- Helping with special events or as requested
- Mentoring a student (generally one-half hour per week)
- Sponsoring and chaperoning school field trips <https://grahamroades.fcps.edu/features/air-space-museum>

Fairfax County Public School requires volunteers who interact with students to undergo a background and fingerprint check. Mentors attend a virtual training session (2 to 3 hours). Volunteering for PTA activities generally requires no background check.

If you are ready to apply, please follow the steps below.

1. Complete Form HR-3 <https://www.fcps.edu/sites/default/files/media/forms/hr3.pdf>. The location is Graham Road Elementary School, 2831 Graham Road, Falls Church 22042

Please return the form to me, preferably in person. For your protection, I will personally carry the form to the admin assistant or to the principal for processing since it may contain your SSN.

If you wish to email the form to me, **do not enter your SSN**.

Once the **HR-3 form** has been processed, each volunteer will receive a series of emails containing the links to 2 online portals:

- Portal 1: Online profile and questions related to previous court involvement.
- Portal 2: Onboarding (background check forms)

If the application indicates *pending*, the applicant (not FCPS) must provide additional information. Please complete these tasks expeditiously. Incomplete applications are timed out within 14 days, requiring the applicant to restart the entire process. If you experience any difficulty during the process, please contact me so either Sue or I can troubleshoot the application.

2. Once onboarding has been processed, volunteers will receive an automated email to schedule a fingerprinting appointment at the FCPS office in Merrifield. There is ample parking, and the process takes minutes to complete.
3. Graham Road will notify me when you are cleared and will send your badge directly to the school. Either Sue Christie or I will contact you and advise you of opportunities as they arise.

Let's Go to the Movies

Mark your calendars for "The Legend of Ochi" on **May 6**. A movie that will speak to your inner child. The Washington Post writer, Ty Burr said "Ochi evoked in me the rapture I haven't felt since 'Beasts of the Southern Wild' in 2012. It is written and directed by Isaiah Saxon.

“The Legend of Ochi” seems to speak to adventurous children and any grown-up who has been one. It takes place in an otherworldly Eastern Europe, on an island with one foot in the Middle Ages and the other in 1970’s Soviet entropy, with dusty supermarkets and boxy cars that don’t run. For generations, the island’s humans have waged an on-again/off-again battle with creatures that live in the mountains, big-eared hominids that split off from Homo sapiens sometime after gorillas but before the Neanderthals. They prey on livestock and unlucky travelers, and a man like Maxim has dedicated his life to hunting them down. Maxim is played by Willem Dafoe with his threadbare macho bravado. The main character is Maxim’s daughter Yuri (Helena Zengel), an unenthusiastic enlistee in his army of little boy monster hunters. Blue-eyed, flaxen haired and defiantly un-girlish, Yuri mopes around the movie until she discovers a newborn Ochi in one of her father’s traps and vows to return it to its mother. The creature resembles Baby Yoda and is adorably fierce. There’s quite a bit of comedy in the movie, some of it blunt. Yuri stumbles across her estranged mother, Dasha (Emily Watson) and the movie moves into a loopy, engrossing Joseph Campbell territory. The movie runs for 96 minutes.


