
Bring your ideas and your appetites to this final meeting of the year!

RECLAIM OUR VOTE POSTCARD CAMPAIGN



Postcard Round-up.

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Now that we have reached the end of the year, you might wonder where we stand with our get-out-the-vote (GOTV) postcards.

First, here are the statistics of postcards written to date:

2025 VA Primary & WI Supreme Court 2.520

Total since July 1, 2024 8,7<u>60</u>

Grand Total since 2020 31,098.

This year's count includes postcards that we wrote last summer and fall for the general election to Florida, Georgia, Virginia, and Texas voters. And over the winter into the spring, we wrote postcards for the Wisconsin Supreme Court election and our own Virginia primaries.

VA general election postcards start in July!

Coming up: a short break before we start **postcarding for Virginia's General Election starts in late July**. The goal is to contact every registered Black voter in the state -- about 900,000 people.

Virginia will likely be our only campaign for the rest of the year, and it is the most consequential election in 2025, with the offices of <u>Governor</u>, <u>Lieutenant Governor</u>, <u>State Attorney General</u>, <u>the entire House of Delegates</u>, and various municipal and school board seats at stake. All of our writers nationwide will be involved, so demand for addresses will be high.

PS. Remember to mail Virginia postcards!

The mailing window for Virginia primary postcards is open! The last day to mail them is May 30, but please mail your postcards as soon as you can. Early voting runs through June 14, and Primary Day is June 17.

Why are we postcarding? FC AAUW started this project to honor the memory of Kitty Richardson, a FC AAUW member and civil rights activist, and in furtherance of AAUW's public policy priority to "support open and fair elections that are broadly accessible to all voters." We write the cards in cooperation with Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) and Center for Common Ground, 501c(3) nonpartisan organizations. And we have helped make a difference! Thank you for helping us reach this milestone!

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

We need your energy and ideas to forge ahead and make progress on AAUW goals. But there are also things you can do to keep the branch activities running. Here are some functions for which we need assistance:

HOSPITALITY CONTACT

Meetings are more fun if we can gather after a presentation for light refreshments and conversation. This person would contact two members to provide cookies, small hors d'oeuvres, or veggies. Usually about 15-20 members attend a meeting. A list will be circulated at the June 8 meeting with tentative dates for members to volunteer. The hospitality contact would remind members to bring snacks on a specific date, buy any supplies (i.e., paper goods) and drinks (usually water). If there is a need to fill a vacancy the hospitality contact person would call other members to pitch in.

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE ONE MEMBER NEEDED

The three-member Scholarship Committee meets in March and April to select winners for our branch scholarship, which are awarded in May. The committee member reads the applications, rates them according to a scale, and meets with other member to discuss the applications and votes on winners. The member participates in the branch scholarship award meeting as needed.


BOOK GROUP LEAD

With members, select book to read. Send out announcement to all members via Flash with name of book and date to discuss. Give a short description of the book. Before the meeting date send out a reminder to members along with Zoom link for the meeting. Book selection is made by members at each meeting. Keep track of books recommended. The frequency of meetings needs to be reviewed by the group in the fall of 2025.

2025 SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS



2025 will mark **75 YEARS** of AAUW FALLS CHURCH helping local young women reach for the stars and achieve their dreams of higher education.

During this time, the organization has raised more than \$200,000 in scholarship funds to help more than 200 local graduates achieve their educational dreams. Many former recipients are now AAUW members across the country while the majority of recent recipients are first-generation US citizens embarking on an educational journey that will greatly enrich their lives as well as the future of our nation.

This year we awarded nine scholarships totaling \$10,000.

Women, War & Peace - Challenges the conventional wisdom that war and peace are men's domain. Watch women's roles in conflict and peacemaking.


